# MONTHLY REPORT OCTOBER 2016

### Possession of Marijuana

On October 1<sup>st</sup> a Sergeant stopped a vehicle in the area of Grand River Ave. and Farmington Road for swerving and improper lane use. It was determined that that driver had a suspended license out of Pennsylvania and was in possession of a vape device containing a liquid THC concentrate. The driver was arrested, transported to jail and issued a citation.

### **Felony Arrest**

On October 3<sup>rd</sup> an officer stopped a vehicle in the area of Orchard Lake and Shiawassee for running a red light. While speaking with the driver of the vehicle, the officer determined that the passenger/owner of the vehicle had a warrant for their arrest out of Shelby Township Police Department. The passenger was taken into custody and held in jail until Shelby Twp. Was able to pick them up.

### **Employee Trouble**

On October 3<sup>rd</sup> a sergeant responded to a Farmington business for a report of a disturbance between two employees. Upon arrival the sergeant learned from management that two of their employees were not getting along, and their verbal argument escalated into a physical fight, at which point, is was alleged that one of the employees threatened the other with a gun. The employee that made the threat was fired on the spot and departed, eventually making their way to the police department to make a report. It was determined that there was, in fact no gun, and that neither of the involved parties wanted to press criminal charges on the other.

### Larceny from Automobile

On October 3<sup>rd</sup> an officer responded to a report stolen property from a commercial service truck. Upon arrival the officer noted broken glass and pry markings on the door of a commercial service (lift) truck which was parked outside of a Farmington business. The officer learned that the crime occurred between 0310-0320 hours, the suspect was captured on surveillance video and the estimated value of the items taken is approximately \$10,000.00. Farmington investigators are currently looking into the matter.

### Possession of Narcotic Paraphernalia

On October 4<sup>th</sup> a sergeant stopped a vehicle in the area of M5 and Halsted for not having a visible license plate. After speaking with the driver, the sergeant learned that

the driver had a suspended license and warrants for their arrest out of Southfield and Oak Park. The driver was subsequently arrested and during the inventory search of the vehicle a marijuana pipe and grinder were discovered. The driver was transported to the jail and issued a citation.

### Possession of Narcotic Paraphernalia

On October 4<sup>th</sup> officers responded to a Farmington business for a report of a male subject using drugs. Upon arrival officers met with and spoke to the reporting party who stated that their spouse had been smoking crack cocaine while caring for their grandchild. Officers discovered evidence of crack cocaine use. The subject was arrested, transported to jail and issued a citation. The child was turned over to a responsible, sober adult.

### **Aggregated Felonious Assault - Murder Attempt**

On October 4<sup>th</sup> Officers responded to a Farmington Apartment Complex for a reported gun-shot wound victim. Upon arrival the officers located a victim with a gunshot wound to the leg. Officers rendered aid and the victim who was transported to Beaumont Farmington Hills where he was treated and later released. Investigators learned from the victim that two black males, dressed in dark clothing, were seeking assistance and asked to use a phone. When refused, the two forced their way into the apartment and a struggle ensued and resulted in the victim being shot in the leg. The two unknown subjects fled on foot from the area. Investigators continue to pursue leads in this matter.

### Possession of Narcotic Paraphernalia

On October 6<sup>th</sup> an officer stopped a vehicle for speed on Drake Road near Drake Heights. While speaking with the driver, who appeared confused and disorganized, the officer reported that they could smell the odor of burnt marijuana coming from the interior of the vehicle. The driver admitted to smoking marijuana in the vehicle the night before. The officer conducted a search of the vehicle and located marijuana, drug paraphernalia and also found the driver to be in possession of a large sum of cash. The driver was subsequently arrested, was transported to the jail and issued citation(s). The driver was also served with civil forfeiture paperwork.

### **Open Burning**

On October 8<sup>th</sup> officers responded to a Farmington residence for a report of a homeowner burning in the backyard of their residence. Upon arrival the homeowner was observed stuffing branches into an outdoor stove that was approximately 10' away from the house. The stove was described as over filled, with fire and embers spilling out of it. The homeowner was advised of the open burn ordinance and told to extinguish the fire, which he did. The responsible was issued a citation for open burn.

### **Operating While Intoxicated**

On October 9<sup>th</sup> a sergeant stopped a vehicle on Farmington near Eight Mile Road for driving without headlights. While talking with the driver the sergeant could smell the odor of an intoxicant and noted that the drivers' eyes were red and glassy. The driver admitted to having four beers in Livonia. The driver completed field sobriety tests,

submitted to a PBT and was subsequently arrested for operating while intoxicated. The driver was transported to jail, housed and issued citations.

### **Possess Crack Cocaine and Narcotic Equipment**

On October 11<sup>th</sup> an officer responded to a Farmington apartment for a report of a failure to return a borrowed vehicle complaint. While the officer was still on scene, the vehicle returned with three occupants. Further discussion and investigation revealed that the use of the vehicle was in exchange for drugs. Two subjects were subsequently arrested for possession of drugs and narcotic equipment and outstanding felony and misdemeanor warrants. The two were transported to the Farmington jail where they were housed pending charges.

### **Suspicious Circumstances**

On October 11<sup>th</sup> an officer responded to a Farmington bank. The reporting party advised that two one-dollar bills (U.S. currency) were presented for deposit. Those bills appeared to be covered in red dye. The bills were collected, preserved and Farmington Detectives will follow up with the U.S. Secret Service.

### Larceny - License Plate

On October 11<sup>th</sup> a sergeant took a front desk report of a stolen metal license plate. The victim advised that the vehicle was parked in front of their home on Prospect when the plate was taken. The plate was entered as stolen.

### Fleeing and Eluding Police

On October 12<sup>th</sup> a sergeant attempted to stop a vehicle in the area of Eight Mile Road near Chelsey. The vehicle did not stop, rapidly accelerated, and failed to stop for a red light at Middlebelt at speeds estimated at 100 mph. The pursuit was quickly terminated for the safety of the public. However, the sergeant was able to obtain a license plate and get a good look at the driver prior to the initiation of the attempted stop. A suspect was identified and the case sent to the Oakland County Prosecutors office for warrant consideration.

### **Possession of Dangerous Drugs**

On October 12<sup>th</sup> an officer stopped a vehicle in the area of Grand River and Hawthorn for driving in the dark without headlights. The officer determined that the driver was driving on a suspended license and there were warrants for his arrest. During the inventory search of the vehicle the officer found a pill, of which, the subject stated that he did not have a prescription. The subject was transported and housed in the Farmington jail. The pill will be submitted to the laboratory for further analysis.

### **Assist Other Law Enforcement Agency**

On October 14<sup>th</sup> an officer assisted Farmington Hills Police while they searched for a subject involved in a physical fight at the Bottom of the Fifth Bar in the area of Ten Mile and Orchard Lake. The Farmington officer located the subject in the area of Orchard Lake and Shiawassee. The subject was determined to the aggressor in the fight and was subsequently arrested and turned over to Farmington Hills Police.

### Retail Fraud 1st Degree - Possession of Heroin

On October 15<sup>th</sup> officers responded to a Farmington business for a report of a white male subject that ran out of the store with a basket of merchandise. The reporting party chased the subject into the parking lot where they observed the male get into a silver Pontiac G6 being driven by a white female. The vehicle departed at a high rate of speed southbound on Farmington Road, a license plate was obtained and relayed to the responding officers. The officers conducting the initial investigation were able to trace the vehicle back to an address on Randall Street in Farmington Hills where the vehicle and two suspects were found hiding and were arrested. The female confessed to her involvement in the theft of Gillette Razor Blades, which were pawned at a local pawn shop for \$5.00 each. Officers learned that the pair are heroin users and the female was later found to be in possession of heroin. The case was presented to the Oakland County Prosecutors Office who authorized charges on both subjects.

### Operating While Intoxicated

On October 16<sup>th</sup> a sergeant stopped a vehicle on Grand River and Smithfield for speeding. While talking with the driver the sergeant could smell the strong odor of an intoxicant coming from the drivers' breath and interior of the vehicle. The sergeant also noted that the drivers' eyes were red and glassy and there was an open 12 oz. bottle of Bud Light beer in the center console. The driver completed field sobriety tests, submitted to a PBT and was subsequently arrested for operating while intoxicated (high BAC). The driver was also in possession of a handgun in violation of CCW law. The driver was transported to jail, housed and issued citations. The handgun was confiscated and the report will be sent to the State Police for review and possible CCW sanctions.

### **Narcotics Arrest**

On October 17<sup>th</sup> a sergeant stopped a vehicle on M5 for speeding. While speaking with the driver the sergeant could smell the strong odor of marijuana inside the vehicle. The driver admitted to smoking marijuana earlier in the day. The sergeant searched the vehicle and found a joint and small baggie of marijuana in the center console. The driver was arrested, brought back to the jail where they were processed, posted bond and released.

### Fraud

On October 17<sup>th</sup> an officer took a front desk report reference a fraud that occurred via wire transfer. The reporting party believes that their and or their attorney's email accounts have been hacked, and as a result the reporting party was directed to deposit money while under the impression they were conducting legitimate business. The deposits totaled approximately \$12,000.00. Farmington investigators are currently working with bank investigators to identify and locate the subject(s) responsible.

### Fraud

On October 17<sup>th</sup> a commander took a front desk report reference a fraud that occurred in response to a "for sale" posting on <a href="www.MIIndia.com">www.MIIndia.com</a>. The reporting party received a message from an unknown subject interested in the item posted for sale, which the agreed upon price was \$160.00. The subject advised that they would send a check in the amount of \$1,300.00 for an item and that the reporting party should send back the

balance in the form of a wire transfer. It was later learned that the original check in the amount of \$1,300.00 was a bad check.

### Retail Fraud

On October 17<sup>th</sup> a commander took a front desk report from the manager of a Farmington business. The manager stated that while reviewing in-store video an unknown b/m and b/f were observed prying open a locked case, subsequently stealing 22 bottles of men's cologne totaling \$1,122.78. Investigators are currently working with management in this case.

### Larceny in a Building - Illegal Use of Credit Card

On October 18<sup>th</sup> an officer responded to a Farmington business a spoke to a social worker who was reporting that a patient's credit card was stolen from a bag beside the patient's bed and possibly used to purchase snacks from a vending machine. There is a suspect in mind, and Investigators are currently working with management to get more video footage.

### Accident - Fail to Stop and Identify

On October 18<sup>th</sup> an officer responded to a report of a crash in the downtown center. A witness to the crash was able to provide the officer with a license plate of the responsible vehicle. The officer located the responsible vehicle and driver, noted damage to the vehicle and subsequently issued the driver a citation.

### **Embezzlement**

On October 19<sup>th</sup> an officer responded to a Farmington business for a report of an embezzlement. The officer met with a loss prevention representative who provided details related to the embezzlement as well as relevant evidence found during the internal investigation. The officer confronted the employee suspected of committing the embezzlements and confirmed the information learned as a result of the internal investigation. The employee was arrested, processed and released pending a review of the case by the Oakland County Prosecutors Office.

### Possession of Marijuana

On October 21<sup>st</sup> an officer stopped a vehicle in the area of Orchard Lake and Grand River for not having a visible license plate on the vehicle. The officer spoke with the driver of the vehicle and learned that they did not have a valid driver's license (suspended), was in possession of marijuana and had warrants for their arrest. It was also determined that two of the passengers also had warrants for their arrest.

### Larceny from Automobile

On October 22<sup>nd</sup> an officer took a late front desk report of a larceny of personal property from the interior of their vehicle. The reporting party, at Farmington apartment resident stated that they were warming up their vehicle with the doors unlocked. When they went to get into the vehicle they noticed some clothing, boots, and shoes were missing from the back seat area. The vehicle was inspected for the presence of any physical evidence, but none was found. There are no listed suspects reported at this time.

### **Burglary - Business**

On October 24<sup>th</sup> officers responded to a Farmington business for an alarm company reporting multiple motion alarm activations. Upon arrival officers discovered that the glass front door had been smashed and entry gained. The investigation revealed that two unknown black male suspects wearing all black, gloves, carrying gym bags gained entry by throwing a rock through the glass. The incident took approximately 20 seconds. Nothing of value was taken and Investigators are working with area agencies that have experienced similar occurrences, via similar means.

### **Operating Under the Influence of Alcohol**

On October 25<sup>th</sup> a sergeant pursued and stopped a vehicle for speed in Orchard Lake for speeds in excess of 90 mph. After stopping and speaking with the driver the sergeant determined that the driver was intoxicated and was subsequently arrested and charged by the Oakland County Prosecutors Office for OWI 2<sup>nd</sup> Offense.

### **Burglary - Residence**

On October 26<sup>th</sup> officers responded to the home of a Farmington resident who reported that their home was broken into and items taken. The initial investigation revealed that unknown subject(s) forced entry into the residence on October 26<sup>th</sup> between 6 AM and 3 PM, taking a number of items from various places within the residence. Investigators are conducting follow up in an attempt to locate some of the items that are identifiable via serial numbers.

### Fraud - Illegal Use of Credit Card

On October 27<sup>th</sup> officers responded to a Farmington business for a report of an employee that had been detained on suspicion of fraudulently using a stolen credit card. Officers met with and spoke with an asset protection investigator who advised that a customer reported losing a credit card in the parking lot of the business. That card was returned to the store by another customer. The card was later used by an employee to purchase items at the same Farmington business. When confronted, the suspect/employee admitted to using the lost card to purchase items that were returned for cash at other locations. Investigators conducted follow up interviews and executed a search warrant at the suspect's residence, recovering the stolen card. The case was presented to the Oakland County Prosecutors Office who authorized charges.

### Possession of Marijuana

On October 28<sup>th</sup> an officer stopped a vehicle on M5/Farmington for speed. A routine query of the occupants revealed that the passengers showed warrants for their arrest, to include a felony warrant for fraud and criminal gang affiliation. The odor of marijuana was also noted to be coming from the interior of the vehicle. Two subjects were subsequently arrested on drug charges and warrants, while the driver was issued citations and released at the scene.

### **Burglary - Business**

On October 29<sup>th</sup> officers responded to a Farmington business for an alarm company reporting an alarm activation. Upon arrival officers discovered that a large glass window had been smashed and entry gained. Officers further discovered that five electrical meters located to the rear of the building had been pulled, effectively terminating

electrical power to the entire building. Due to the power outage there was no surveillance video of the incident. Nothing of value was taken and Investigators are working with area agencies that have experienced similar occurrences, via similar means.

### **Operating Under the Influence of Alcohol**

On October 29<sup>th</sup> a sergeant responded to an area BOL for a suspected drunk driver. The sergeant located and stopped a vehicle in the area of Farmington and Nine Mile based on the information provided by the caller and improper lane usage. After stopping and speaking with the driver the sergeant determined that the driver was intoxicated and was subsequently arrested, issued a citation and lodged in jail until sober.

### Larceny from Automobile

On October 30<sup>th</sup> an officer responded to Schulte Street for report of a larceny of personal property from the interior of their vehicle overnight. The reporting party stated that they woke to find the trunk of their Mazda Miata open and items missing. The vehicle was inspected for the presence of any physical evidence, but none was found. There are no listed suspects reported at this time.

### Additional Information

During the month of October, all public safety officers and reserve firefighters received training in hazardous materials operations and mitigation.

The Public Safety/City Hall building security project is underway and scheduled to be complete by early November. Crews have been pulling wire and installing cameras and door security hardware throughout the building. All City employees will be provided with a key card and receive training on the operability of the security system in the coming weeks.

### 3. PUBLIC COMMENT

Fritz Beirmeister, School Board candidate, introduced himself to Council and expressed a desire for the City and School Board to work more closely together.

Ken Chiara, 33630 Shiawassee, expressed concern regarding water rates that continue to rise. He encouraged Council to pass a proposed traffic ordinance that would allow on street parking on Shiawassee.

Chuck Eudy, Superintendent of Public Services, expressed concern regarding on street parking on Shiawassee. He discussed the many difficulties that would result if this were to occur.

### 4. CIVIC THEATER

### A. Consideration to Approve Request for Civic HVAC Unit

Present: Scott Freeman, Civic Theater General Manager

Freeman discussed the need for the installation of a new HVAC system and the choice of Quality Heating and Cooling as a result of the bidding process.

Scott expressed concern regarding Freeman's recommendation of a Bryant system.

Cowley suggested closing the alley when the unit is installed; he suggested leveraging the purchase of future units.

Discussion followed regarding approaching bidders for three additional units over the next three years thereby reducing costs.

Demers stated for heavy snows his department would issue a snow emergency, eliminating parking on street, and temporary traffic control order during leaf pick-up.

Responding to a question from Cowley, Demers was not concerned about accommodating emergency vehicle traffic with the proposed change.

Responding to an additional question by Cowley, Demers stated if the costs outweigh the benefits the proposed change should be re-visited. He believes it is worth a shot.

Schneemann is interested in how many citations are issued each year on Shiawassee. Demers did not have data available, but noted this road is not a hotspot for speeders.

Schneemann clarified that the lanes would be 11' wide. He expressed support for the proposed change, but was concerned about garbage pick-up during rush hour. He suggested City Administration request that Waste Management does garbage pick-up during non-peak hours. He also discussed the difficulty of the proposed traffic order during leaf pick-up.

Galvin discussed the cost of striping and re-striping if it doesn't work out. He asked if the city is creating a new set of problems.

Scott expressed support for trying out the proposed changes.

Galvin would like this traffic order placed back on the agenda in March/April to reassess the benefits.

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 PM by Mayor William Galvin.

# 3. PUBLIC COMMENT

Maria Taylor, 23750 Gill Road, expressed opposition to the proposed food truck ordinance. She cited reasons for her position.

Jordan Ceresnie, 33107 Hawthorne St., a food truck owner, expressed concern about the proposed food truck ordinance.

#### 4. NEW BUSINESS

# A. Consideration to Provide City of Farmington Residents the Water Residential Assistance Program (WRAP) Administered by Oakland Livingston Human Service Agency.

Murphy provided information on WRAP.

Bowman clarified that this only applies to residential customers, that the Treasury Department is on board with the program, and that there is no cost to the city to participate.

Scott questioned whether the subsidy is sufficient to cover the water bill.

Eudy stated that WRAP provides financial assistance to qualified residents. He noted that during the time residents participate in the program their water bills that are in arrears would not be placed on tax roll.

Cowley sees no downside to the program.

Responding to a question by Galvin, Eudy advised residents need to apply to participate in WRAP.

Galvin inquired about how the public will be notified of the program. Eudy stated that literature will be included with the quarterly billing, and postings will be placed on the city website, Facebook page, etc.

Discussion followed regarding delinquent water bills.

Eudy noted this program does not apply to sewage bills.

Galvin suggested moving this item to the November regular agenda.

# B. Consideration to Introduce an Ordinance to Amend the City's Special Events Article Regarding Food Trucks

Murphy presented proposed ordinance to address food trucks.

Schneeman asked how the proposed ordinance compares to those of other communities.

Schultz responded that some cities have ordinances where trucks can operate all year long, while others have designated areas. The proposed ordinance is on the other end of the spectrum with limited provision for mobile trucks. He is not aware of other communities with similar ordinances.

Schneeman noted that this is the first time the city is addressing use of food trucks and as a result, future changes may be necessary.

In reviewing the proposed ordinance, Schneeman asked why food trucks are limited to only three special event permits per year.

Schultz stated that it is to limit the number of events in a year based on the number of trucks that are available. He noted that a food truck as part of a special event does not count toward the permit limitation. He confirmed that there is no limit on food truck rallies in the ordinance.

Schneemann noted typo in Sec. 4-198, e-9, "within" should read "without." He summarized the proposed ordinance does allow for food truck rallies and provides businesses the opportunity to have food trucks. He stated the ordinance may be conservative, but it is the step in the right direction. It gives the city parameters under which to operate.

Schneemann asked about what might be missing from the ordinance. He questioned whether there is a desire to have a space where food trucks can operate all the time.

Discussion followed regarding limited space for food trucks in the downtown. Scott believes Shiawassee Park is underutilized and offers potential for food truck rallies. He would like to attract millennials to the downtown.

Responding to a question from Cowley, Murphy stated the fee amount has not been established. He stated it could possibly be \$100.

Cowley expressed support for food trucks in Shiawassee Park, but he is not a fan of them in the downtown. He believes food trucks take revenue from local restaurants. He thinks that there are enough events already. He sees no benefit to rallies in downtown. He thinks it will exacerbate parking in downtown even further. He expressed support for the proposed ordinance.

Bowman expressed support for food trucks in all areas of the city. She stated according to research, food trucks attract people who would otherwise not come to the community. She discussed food truck ordinances of some of the surrounding communities. She is glad the city is developing an ordinance; it will remove gray areas and will level the playing field. She would like to have a fee scale established that would require different fees for different circumstances. She would like to see the 3 special event limit changed to 4.

Galvin stated perspective and context is critical is looking at this ordinance. He stated it is important that the public realize that Farmington does not have a food truck ordinance and currently they are not allowed. He stated what the city is attempting to achieve with this ordinance is to provide a structured environment that will allow and expand this type of business.

Galvin used three guiding principles in looking at the proposed ordinance: 1) listen to citizens, 2) don't take anything away that is already in place, and 3) through this ordinance remove the need for policy making or city council approval as set forth in an administrative process.

Addressing public comment, Galvin believes this ordinance is not arbitrary, but rather it's based on considerable discussion and research. He noted it is generous and allows for many opportunities for food trucks in Farmington. He mentioned that the fee schedule would be discussed separately from the ordinance.

Discussion followed regarding the process for establishing a fee schedule.

Responding to a question from Galvin, Murphy advised the "150 people provision that would require Council approval" was eliminated from the food truck ordinance and is part of the special events policy.

Schneeman advised he would support changing the limitation from 3 to 4 events a year.

Galvin advised the Downtown Development Authority reviewed this provision and believed 3 events is consistent with what is currently in practice.

Scott questioned whether there is a demand for 4 events per year. He stated businesses using food trucks are not designed to support them. He noted adding more events would place a larger burden on bathroom facilities, etc.

Move to introduce Ordinance C-782-2016 to amend the City of Farmington Code of Ordinances, Chapter 4, Article VI, Special Events, to cover the use of food trucks as presented. [SEE ATTACHED ORDINANCE].

The City's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding for 2016 is projected by Oakland County to be \$22,622. As part of the application process, the city must hold a public hearing. Our completed application, accompanied by a resolution of Council approval, must be submitted to Oakland County by December 16, 2016.

As Council knows, CDBG funding eligibility is restricted to projects or programs that meet specific objectives determined by the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Of these objectives, Farmington is limited to CDBG funding for projects where "the primary beneficiaries are low or moderate income people."

Council may recall from previous years' CDBG applications that senior programs/projects receive special eligibility consideration. The administration's preliminary recommendation, outlined below, proposes a CDBG program that is not administratively burdensome, and continues current city funding level for the senior center and senior services.

CDBG funds are federal funds administered by the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The administration's preliminary recommendation is that Council considers establishing the following development objectives: (1) senior center and (2) public services (senior services). The administration proposes allocating \$15,836 for senior center and \$6,786 for public services (senior services).

Please note that at is November 2, 2016 meeting, the Farmington Downtown Development Authority Board of Directors approved an allocation of up to \$15,000.00 toward this project. Three (3) prospective bidders obtained plans and specifications for the project. Proposals were received from three (3) bidders. Bids with as-checked results ranged from \$39,516.00 to \$63,175.50. The engineer's estimate for the project was approximately \$40,000.00.

We evaluated all three bidders, having familiarity with all three. In reviewing the bids, all information, including bond surety, statement of qualifications, and subcontractors listing, was provided. The lowest bid was received from J. # Background:

The City has contacted Garland Company Incorporated to evaluate and produced a roof asset management schedule for all municipal building roofs. Following the evaluation of the DPW Building, Nine Mile Booster and Nine Mile Retention facilities the asset management program suggest to replace Nine Mile Booster, and Nine Mile Retention Pump building roofs. This evaluation recommends two buildings are in critical need of roof replacement.

Garland Company has recently been awarded the contract to replace Farmington Hills DPW roof.

Due to funding limitations the scope of the roof replacement this Fiscal Year will be focused at the 9 Mile Retention Pump building.

The City has received estimates for the work to be performed and the Nine Mile Retention Pump building of an estimated cost of \$64,750 and the motion to include a \$6,475 contingency budget (approximately 10%) for a total construction budget of \$71,225. If Council would like to proceed, a budget amendment will be necessary.

The Fiscal Year 2016/17 Budget has allocated \$80,000 for the DPW Roof replacement project. \$40,000 from the 2016/17 Water & Sewer Budget and \$40,000 from the 2016/17 General Fund Budget. If Council wishes to proceed, the W&S budget Capital Outlay expenditure will need to be increased by \$31,225, and the \$40,000 budgeted in the General Fund and Capital Improvement Fund for DPW roof replacement will be eliminated.

City of Farmington Director of Finance and Administration has been informed of the change in the scope of the project. He recommends drawing the additional funding from the Water & Sewer fund balance for the roof replacement at the Nine Mile Retention Pump building.
