MONTHLY REPORT SEPTEMBER 2016

OUID

On September 2nd a Sergeant on patrol on Eight Mile near Chesley ran a license plate which returned not valid, and conducted a traffic stop to investigate further. While speaking with the driver and passenger the odor of marijuana was detected within the vehicle. The driver stated that they were not is possession of marijuana, but admitted to smoking two "blunts" prior to getting behind the wheel to drive. The driver submitted to field sobriety evaluations and further admitting to smoking three to four "blunts". The driver was subsequently arrest for OUID, issued a citation and housed in the jail overnight.

Felony Warrant

On September 2nd an Officer conducting stationary speed enforcement on Drake Road observed a vehicle whose registered owner returned showing two felony arrest warrants for felonious assault. The officer identified the driver to be the registered owner/wanted person. The subject was taken into custody and held in the jail pending pickup.

Stolen/Recovered License Plate

On September 2nd a Farmington resident reported at the front desk that an unknown subject stole her license plate, removing it from her vehicle. It was determined that Dearborn Police recovered the stolen plate a short time later.

CCW Violation

On September 5th an Officer on patrol stopped a vehicle for speed in the area of Grand River and Nine Mile Roads. A traffic stop and subsequent identification of the driver revealed that they were driving while license suspended and that they were illegally in possession of a stun gun. The driver admitted to carrying the device for protection and that they were not aware that possession of the device is unlawful. The driver was taken into custody and housed. The case forwarded to the Oakland County Prosecutors Office for warrant consideration.

Counterfeiting

On September 6th a Farmington business reported that when counting their drawers they discovered that a counterfeit twenty dollar bill was passed. The time and register of the occurrence was not known at the time the report was taken. The case will be reviewed by Farmington Investigators.

Receiving & Concealing / False ID / Open Alcohol

On September 7th a Sergeant stopped a vehicle on Orchard Lake near Shiawassee for failure to stop on a red light. As a result of the stop, it was learned that the license plate displayed on the vehicle had been reported as stolen in Farmington Hills. The driver was found to be driving on a suspended license and was in possession of open alcohol within the motor vehicle. The driver was arrested and as a result of the booking and fingerprinting process, it was determined that the driver had provided a false name. The true identity of the driver was revealed and was found to have numerous active warrants for their arrest. The driver was issued citations and housed in the jail overnight.

Possession of Marijuana

3.B.a

On September 8th a Commander on patrol on Drake Road stopped a vehicle for speed. It was determined that the driver of the speeding vehicle was in possession of suspected marijuana. The driver was taken into custody, issued a citation and house in the jail overnight.

Home Invasion / Felonious Assault

On September 8th at approximately 0400 hours a Farmington resident was awakened by a subject who began physically assaulting him. The suspect demanded undisclosed personal property from the victim. At this time, investigators believe that the suspect had previous information about the resident and this was not a random crime. The suspect was described as a black male approximately 20-30 years of age, approximately 6 feet tall and heavy build, medium brown skin tone, wearing tan Timberland boots, shorts, and a shirt wrapped around his head so his face could not be seen. Farmington investigators are working with other local, state and federal authorities to identify the suspect in this crime.

Larceny from Building

On September 8th a Sergeant responded to a report of stolen tools that were taken from two unsecured homes that are currently under construction on Laurelwood Court. The project manager confirmed that the structures were left unsecured and he suspects that the tools were taken by other contractors. The incidents are currently under investigation.

Stolen / Recovered Vehicle

On September 8th a Farmington resident reported that a Chevrolet Panel Van was stolen from in front of his residence on Violet Street sometime between September 4th and 5th. The vehicle was recovered in Detroit on the Davidson Freeway on September 5th and returned to the owner.

Assault

On September 9th while investigating a trespassing complaint, officers learned of an assault that occurred on September 8th involving two Farmington residents. Officers located the victim of the assault who stated his intent to seek prosecution as well as an independent witness who provided corroborating information. The suspect, who is known to FDPS, was located, arrested and housed in jail overnight.

Possession of Marijuana

3.B.a

On September 10th a Sergeant on patrol on Freedom and Farmington Roads conducted an investigatory stop of a vehicle. It was determined that the driver was driving while license suspended, was in possession of suspected marijuana blunt, and had an active arrest warrant. The driver was taken into custody, issued a citation and house in the jail overnight.

Suspicious Circumstance

On September 13th officers were dispatched to the parking lot of the Village Commons Shopping Center, for a report of two males arguing. It was also reported that one of the males had a baseball bat. Officers arrived on scene and conducted an investigation and learned the argument was between a business owner and his former employee. The argument concerned the former employee's back wages and was resolved between the two. The business owner did not want to pursue charges.

Larceny from Automobile

On September 13th officers were dispatched to an address on Lakeway St. for a report of someone going through a parked vehicle. Officers arrived in the area and were able to locate the suspect and detain him. The suspect was positively identified by the caller and was arrested. Further investigation determined that nothing had been taken from the vehicle. The suspect was charged with disorderly conduct.

Larceny from Automobile / Recovered Stolen Property

On September 14th officers were dispatched to Shiawassee Park on a report of a larceny from a vehicle (LFA). Officers arrived on scene and learned that a women had parked her car in the parking lot for approximately one hour while at the park. When she returned to her vehicle she noticed her driver's side rear window had been smashed out. An inventory of the vehicle showed that her purse had been taken. Officers canvassed the park for investigative leads. During this canvass numerous credit cards, several women's wallets, and a necklace were found in a nearby trash can. A computer check showed these items had been stolen in LFA's in West Bloomfield, Oakland County, and Canton. Follow-up with these agencies was conducted.

Operating Under the Influence of Narcotics

On September 15th our officers were alerted by Farmington Hills Police Units that a suspicious vehicle had just left their employee parking lot. A Farmington officer located this vehicle in the area of Farmington Rd and Shiawassee St. The vehicle was traveling with no headlights on. A traffic stop was made and subsequent investigation revealed the driver was under the influence of prescription medication. The driver was arrested for operating a vehicle under the influence of narcotics and lodged at the Farmington jail.

Felony Warrant Arrest

On September 18th a Sergeant stopped a vehicle for conducting a prohibited turn at Grand River Ave. and Farmington Rd. A computer check of one of the passenger showed he had a felony child neglect warrant out of the Michigan Attorney General's Office. The subject was arrested and held for pickup at our facility.

Larceny from Grounds

3.B.a

On September 19th officers responded to a report of yard decorations that had been taken within the past two weeks. The decorations were reported to be cement statues. There are no suspects and the resident stated that they would report any further suspicious activity in the area.

B&E/Home Invasion - Residence

On September 20th officers were dispatched to a report of a B&E of an unoccupied residence on Hayden Street. It was determined that a residential a/c unit and a hot water heater were removed from the residence. After canvassing the area, it was learned that two older black male subjects driving a blue Chevy mini-van had been seen at the residence; possibly associated with a restoration company that had been doing work on the residence prior. Detectives are currently working on leads in other jurisdictions that experienced similar incidents.

Disorderly Conduct

On September 21st officers responded to a disorderly male at the Shiawassee Parkview Apartment complex. Upon arrival, it was determined that a resident of the building had been pounding on doors, being belligerent and acting in an aggressive manner. The subject has a history of assaultive behavior and on this occasion was issued a citation for disorderly conduct. The apartment manager was notified and is looking into the eviction process.

Larceny for Automobile

On September 21st Sergeant responded to business on Farmington Road for a report of an LFA. Officers found that a vehicle belonging to an employee had its window smashed out and purse taken. The purse had been in pain view and contained the victim's identification, cash and credit cards. There were no witnesses to the crime and no suspect information at this time.

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On September 24th a Sergeant stopped a vehicle on Grand River Ave., near Lakeway for an equipment violation. While speaking with the driver of the vehicle the Sergeant noted and learned that the driver had been drinking. The driver was asked to complete field sobriety tests and was ultimately arrested for operating while intoxicated. The passenger was found to be in possession of open alcohol, drug paraphernalia, had a warrant for their arrest, but was cited and release. The vehicle was impounded and the driver taken to the Farmington jail where they remained overnight.

Alcohol Offenses

During this time period, Farmington Public Safety Officers arrested three drivers for operating while intoxicated and issued two occupants of motor vehicles for possessing open alcohol.

Narcotic Paraphernalia

On September 26th a dayshift officer stopped a vehicle for a red light violation on Grand River Ave., near grove. The officer learned that the driver had a suspended driver's license and a subsequent inventory search found that the driver was in possession of a

marijuana pipe and grinder. The driver was taken into custody and issued a citation for the offenses.

3.B.a

Disorderly Conduct

On September 27th officers responded to Kensington Manor Apartments for complaint about a resident causing a disturbance. Officers had previously responded to similar incidents involving the same subject on at least four prior occasions. Like those previous occurrences the subject was found to be highly intoxicated and banging on doors and windows. The subject was issued a citation for disorderly conduct – intoxication and the apartment complex management was advised.

Larceny in a Building

On September 28th an officer responded to a Farmington business for a report of a stolen Samsung Galaxy Note 5. The initial investigation included the review of the stores video surveillance footage and the interview of witnesses. The initial reporting officer was able to develop a suspect, but attempts to reach that suspect have been unsuccessful. The case has been assigned to a detective for further follow up.

On September 29th officers responded to the Farmington Dollar Tree for a report of malicious destruction of property. The initial officer learned from store management that unknown subject(s) have caused damage inside the store five times in the past seven days. The manager reported that the unknown subject(s) have poured out soap, spray painted displays, spray pained the floors, dispensed silly string, poured out bleach and smeared oil on the glass windows. Store employees stated that they had not witnesses the incidents and do not have any suspects in mind at this time.

Possession of Marijuana

On September 29th an officer stopped a vehicle in the area of Grand River Ave. and Shiawassee for a break light that was out. While the officer was speaking with the driver the officer notice the odor of marijuana coming from inside of the vehicle. Upon questioning, the officer learned that that driver just picked up the 20 grams of marijuana, which they paid \$140.00. The driver was subsequently arrested for the possession of marijuana, was transported to the jail and issued a citation.

Possession of Marijuana and Narcotic Paraphernalia

On September 29th an officer stopped a vehicle in the area of Orchard Lake and Shiawassee for having one headlight out. While the officer was speaking with the driver the officer noticed the strong odor of marijuana and perfume coming from inside of the vehicle. The officer also noticed a bright green container with "Rx" printed on it on the passenger seat. Upon questioning, the driver admitted that she gets marijuana from her boyfriend who is a medical marijuana card holder. The driver was subsequently arrested for the possession of marijuana and narcotic paraphernalia, was transported to the jail and issued a citation.

Fraudulently Obtaining Goods

On September 30th officers responded to the basement burger bar for a report that a customer became angry and skipped out on their meal/drink tab after being refused any

more alcohol. The subject responsible departed in a Ford Focus, but the license plate provided by the witnesses was not the correct license plate. None of the BBB employees recognized the unknown subject.

Trespass

3.B.a

On September 30th officers responded to a customer trouble at Hungry Howie's. Officers learned from management that a former customer, which they had previously had made a computer note to refuse service, continued to call and then arrived at the store causing a disturbance. The former customer admitted to calling and coming up to confront the manager. A database check of the subject revealed a felony warrant for CCW violation out of Farmington Public Safety. The subject was taken to jail as well as advised not to return to or call that particular Hungry Howie's again.

Additional Information

During the month of September, public safety officers and reserve firefighters participated in live burn training. Personnel were presented with a number of scenarios aimed at sharpening their fire ground operational skills.

In addition, the department took delivery of a fire gear washer/extractor which was obtained via a 2016 FEMA Assistance to Fire Fighters grant. The washer/extractor removes harmful soot and chemicals that firefighter turnout gear is exposed to during firefighting operations.

6. PRESENTATION/PUBLIC HEARINGS

A. Parking Advisory Committee feedback on city parking map

Present: Elizabeth Turton, Chair of Parking Advisory Committee

Turton discussed recommendations for proposed changes to downtown parking.

Responding to a question from Schneemann, Turton stated the Advisory Committee did not discuss related costs to the proposed changes.

Responding to an additional question from Schneemann, Director Demers confirmed that State Street is a designated fire route and only parking on the north side would be allowable.

Responding to a question from Bowman, Director Demers stated the proposed changes would result in 20-25 additional parking spaces.

Discussion followed regarding possible opportunities to convert private lots to public lots in the downtown. Turton noted discussions were held with the Salem Church regarding use of their lot, but it was cost prohibitive.

Scott thanked the Parking Committee for their efforts in addressing parking in the downtown.

Galvin thanked Turton for her role as chairperson of the committee. He noted the committee is creating parking at minimal or no cost. He stated prior to the committee, no one was focused on addressing the parking needs of the downtown. He asked if the committee is doing anything to cultivate relationships with private lot owners.

Turton advised the committee has reached out to two private lot owners with only one being receptive to the idea.

Galvin asked if the committee had considered making Oakland Street one-way between Grand River and Farmington.

Turton responded the committee had discussed this possibility at length, but the road is not wide enough to allow for parking without the elimination of the sidewalk.

Galvin suggested City Administration consider adding parking to the south side rather than the north side of Thomas Street. He discussed the ongoing challenges of the north lot.

7. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. Discuss Proposed Consumers Energy Company Gas Franchise Ordinance

G. Consideration to Formally Support Grand River Road Diet as Proposed by MDOT

Christiansen discussed provisions of a resolution that supports the completion of the overall Grand River Road Diet. He provided a Powerpoint presentation on what the proposed re-striping will look like.

Responding to a question from Scott, Christiansen stated the bike lane was designated on the north side of Grand River due to the topography of the road.

Scott advised bike lanes cannot be on both sides of Grand River due to the narrowness of the lanes.

Responding to a question from Bowman, Christiansen stated the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) will provide standard signage; and that crosswalks will be designated through striping and signage.

Christiansen confirmed there will be no cost to the city given that this is an MDOT project.

Bowman noted the bike lane is short, but should be appreciated as part of the bigger picture.

Schneemann thanked Christiansen for all his efforts in working with MDOT to ensure the restriping will take place as part of the Grand River resurfacing project. He is very excited to see this happen.

Discussion followed regarding the issue of truck traffic and how it can be addressed.

Demers advised that Grand River is a state trunk line so the city is limited in how traffic can be restricted. He offered to reach out to MDOT to determine the city's options.

Discussion followed regarding stimulation of economic development on the south side of Grand River as a result of this proposed road diet.

Scott advised this road diet is significant in that MDOT is not used to giving up road. He stated the city is hoping to stretch the bike lane and road diet out further, but development must happen one segment at a time. He stated this is only Phase One and is hoping for more phases in the future.

Schneemann stated the city deserves credit for pushing MDOT to consent to this road diet. He inquired regarding the speeds entering the city from the west. He stated it is his understanding that we can't change the speeds during the project, but once it is completed proposed changes can be submitted to MDOT.

Christiansen advised that because we are not changing the width of the road or traffic volume or capacity, there is no basis for changing speed limits. He stated

as the road diet is implemented there may be a basis for changing the speeds. He reiterated that a change has to occur in order to change speeds.

Demers explained the reasons for the current speed limits on Grand River west of Farmington Road.

Schneemann commented for the record that the posted speeds need to change to support the area. He stated the 25 mph speed limit needs to be extended further west on Grand River. He stated the city likes to say we are walkable and this would be a critical step towards that goal.

Christiansen discussed ongoing redevelopment projects in the city.

Demers stated security upgrades for city hall will take two weeks to complete. He noted Sharon Davis, a crossing guard for 26 years, will be stepping down due to illness.

Murphy discussed a number of events taking place in the city.

10. COUNCIL COMMENT

Cowley discussed a seminar he recently attended at the Michigan Municipal League (MML) conference regarding driverless cars. He stated the prediction is commercial driverless vehicles will be in place in 3-5 years; minimal infrastructure changes will be required; and less parking will be needed.

Schneemann also discussed the seminar on driverless cars as well as one on millennials in government. He stated driverless cars present a significant opportunity in that they would reduce distracted driving and they know how to obey traffic laws. He expressed concern regarding investing a huge amount of money in infrastructure in the downtown if driverless cars are the wave of the future. He noted the importance of attracting millennials to the downtown.

Bowman discussed the MML session on bike lanes presented by City of Livonia. She noted that she recently worked at the Farmers Market information booth where a question board was started asking "Where did you park?". They discovered that

the city has a lot of parking that is underutilized. She suggested installing better directional signage for parking.

Scott discussed the MML session on the November ballot proposal for a 1.2 mil increase supporting the Regional Transportation Authority. He discussed the importance of having a Regional Transportation Authority that would be an umbrella organization over all of public transportation in the tri-county area.

Galvin discussed the MML session on how financing for municipalities is broken. He discussed the declines in revenue from property taxes and state revenue sharing. He pointed out that the State of Michigan has had the least revenue growth than any other state. He stated revenue of the city does not track with the economy. The city has a fixed number of financial tools that continue to show a decrease in net revenue, yet we continue to provide the same level of services. He advised municipalities must build their way out of the fiscal spiral. He stated the State of Michigan continues to develop a budget on the backs of local governments.

Requested Action:

Move to ratify payment to Eagle Star Equipment in the amount of \$12,631.00 for the purchase and installation of a fire turnout gear washer/extractor.

Background:

The National Fire Protection Agency (NFPA) standard 1851 sets forth the standards for selection, care, and maintenance requirements for structural fire fighting protective ensembles and the individual ensemble elements that include garments, helmets, gloves, footwear, and interface components. NFPA 1851 further states that soiled protective gear should be washed in a highly programmable front-load washer-extractor. A highly programmable washer allows fire departments to alter how they wash gear based on changing recommendations and fabric innovations.

In an effort to meet his standard, the Farmington Public Safety Department applied for and received a 2016 FEMA Assistance to Firefighters grant in the amount of \$13,800.00 for the purchase and installation of a turnout gear washer/extractor. The department took delivery of the unit on September 30, 2016 and installation was completed in October 3, 2016. The invoice from Eagle Star Equipment is attached.

The purchase of a washer/extractor was included in the FY 15/16 public safety capital budget.

Under Michigan law (MCL765.12a) law enforcement agencies are permitted to collect a fee not to exceed \$10.00 from a person who posts bond on an outstanding warrant. The fee is collected to help defray the cost of receiving, depositing and delivering bond money.

In 2015, the public safety department made 270 warrant arrests. Had the proposed fee been implemented, the City would have generated \$2700 in revenue. To date, the department has made 193 warrant arrests.

Description: Consideration to Amend Public Safety Fee Schedule - Fingerprints

Requested Action:

Approve proposed increase of ink fingerprint card fees for non-residents to \$20.00. Approve proposed increase of electronic fingerprint administrative fees for applicants to \$20.00

Background:

The public safety department has not proposed increases in ink fingerprinting fees for more than twenty (20) years. Currently, the department charges \$5.00 for residents and \$8.00 for non-residents. A survey of public safety agencies throughout Michigan revealed that the average fee for non-residents is \$20.00 while the fee for residents ranges from \$5.00 to \$15.00. As a courtesy to Farmington residents, the department will not seek an increase in resident ink fingerprinting fees.

The department is also a state approved location for electronic fingerprinting for certain job applicants that require state and federal background checks. Public safety personnel have been facilitating electronic fingerprinting requests from applicants since 2013. The fees for electronic fingerprints are substantially higher because the fingerprint data is processed through state and federal databases. For example, an applicant seeking employment with a public school is charged a set fee of \$44.75 for state and federal processing in addition to the administrative fee established by the municipality.

Currently, the department charges a \$10.00 administrative fee for applicant electronic fingerprints. A survey of public safety agencies throughout Michigan revealed that the average administrative fee is \$20.00. There is no resident exception for applicant electronic fingerprinting.

The fee for electronic fingerprints does not currently appear in Chapter 6, Section 1 of the fee schedule manual. The department is proposing the addition of an administrative fee of \$20.00 for electronic fingerprinting fee in addition to the mandated state and federal charges.

Background:

In conjunction with the city's consulting engineers Orchard Hiltz & McCliment (OHM), bids were solicited for the Bel-Aire, Shiawassee, Mooney Street Sewer Rehabilitation and Improvements. This project is separated into three divisions.

Division I Bel Aire Subdivision

Division II Shiawassee Road/US-16 Drain

Division III Mooney Street

Due to bids coming in slightly higher than anticipated, due to availability and time of the year this project bid was let. OHM has reviewed the bids with the City DPW and recommended proceeding with Divisions I and III at this time. Division II was not to be started until June 2017, so this can be added to the contract at a later date or rebid during the winter months.

The bids were opened on Friday, September 23, 2016. A total of three (3) bids were received which are listed below. OHM has reviewed the bid tabulations along with contractor work history and references, and is recommending to award the reduced contract to Bidigare Contractors Inc. The lowest bid received was from Bidigare Contractors Inc, who also received the highest QBS rating. If approved, work would begin this fall/Early winter 2016.

Dear Mr. Eudy:

Sealed bids for the Bel-Aire, Shiawassee & Mooney Street Sewer Rehabilitation and Improvements project were received and publicly read aloud at 2:00 p.m. on Friday September 23, 2016 at the City of Farmington offices. The project is broken into three phases. Bel-Aire is the first division, Shiawassee is the second division, and the third division is Mooney Street. Proposals were received from three (3) bidders. Bids with as-checked results ranged from \$797,005.00 to \$933,098.00.

We evaluated all three bidders, Bidigare Contractors, Inc. and V.I.L. Construction, Inc., and Macomb Pipeline & Utilities Co. In reviewing the bids, all information, including bond surety, statement of qualifications, and subcontractors listing, was provided. The lowest bid was received from Bidigare Contractors, Inc., located at 7820 Chubb Road, Northville, MI. They also received the highest Quality Based Selection (QBS) rating., having performed work within the City on projects that were completed on time and under budget.

Due to the bids coming in slightly higher than anticipated, due to availability and time of year this was bid. We have reviewed the bids with the City DPS and recommend proceeding with Divisions I and II at this time. Division II wasn't anticipated to start until June 2017, so this can be added to the contract at a later date or rebid during the winter months. OHM has reviewed the televised segments and have concluded that Segments 8, 26, 17 and 11 can be removed from Division I of the contract at this time, and placed on a watch list. These segments should be televised 1-2 times annually to ensure the condition of the pipes are not getting worse. If these segments do not deteriorate and lining is performed in the next 34-36 months, open-cut may not be needed.

We recommend the City proceed with the open-cut repairs for Segments 13, 5, 25, 10, and 6 based on the current conditions. Based on the bid prices reduced from Bidigare, and the revised Mobilization, Maintenance of Traffic, and Audio Video Route Survey pay items, the new cost for Bel-Aire (Division I) is \$278,736.00.

It is felt that Bidigare Contractors, Inc. and their subcontractors are capable of performing the work based on past experiences, referenced projects, and information provided with the statement of qualifications in the bid package. **Based** on the submitted information, it is recommended that Divisions I and III of the Bel-Aire, Shiawassee & Mooney Street Sewer Rehabilitation and Improvements contract be awarded to Bidigare Contractors, Inc. of Northville, MI in the not to exceed amount of \$392,415.00, which includes an approximate 7% contingency to help cover unforeseen issues.

Requested Action:

Move to schedule a public hearing on November 21, 2016 for public comment on the proposed Program Year 2017 Community Development Block Grant application.

Background:

The City's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding for 2017 is projected by Oakland County to be \$22,622. As part of the application process, the city must hold a public hearing. Our completed application, accompanied by a resolution of Council approval, must be submitted to Oakland County by December 16, 2016.

As Council knows, CDBG funding eligibility is restricted to projects or programs that meet specific objectives determined by the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Of these objectives, Farmington is limited to CDBG funding for projects where "the primary beneficiaries are low or moderate income people."

Council may recall from previous years' CDBG applications that senior programs/projects receive special eligibility consideration. The administration's preliminary recommendation, outlined below, proposes a CDBG program that is not administratively burdensome, and continues current city funding level for the senior center and senior services.

CDBG funds are federal funds administered by the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The administration's preliminary recommendation is that Council considers establishing the following development objectives: (1) senior center and (2) public services (senior services). The administration proposes allocating \$15,836 for senior center and \$6,786 for public services (senior services).

This Maintenance Agreement ("Agreement") is made this _____day of _____, 2016, between the Board of County Road Commissioners of the County of Oakland, State of Michigan, a public body corporate, hereinafter referred to as the "Board," and the City of Farmington, Oakland County Michigan, a Michigan municipal corporation hereinafter referred to as the "City."

WHEREAS, certain county primary and local roads more specifically set forth in Exhibit A, attached hereto, are under the jurisdiction and control of the Board and are located within or adjacent to the City; and

WHEREAS, The City desires to be responsible for certain maintenance of said roads under the terms of this Agreement, and the Board is willing to participate in the cost thereof as provided in Section III of this Agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual convenants set forth herein as provided, it is hereby agreed as follows:

Ι

The City will perform Maintenance of certain roads under the terms of this Agreement, and the Board will participate in the cost thereof as provided in Section III of this Agreement. "Maintenance," herein required to be performed by the City, shall mean routine roadway surface operations, care and maintenance of shoulders and approaches, drainage and roadside maintenance and snow removal and ice control, which shall include the following minimum requirements:

Maintenance shall also include other methods necessary to make the roads reasonably safe for public travel in accordance with MCL 224.21; and such other work and services, such as recordkeeping and maintenance of insurance, required by this Agreement. The city shall perform Maintenance on the roads listed in Exhibit A. All Maintenance work and services performed by the City shall be in accordance with the Board's maintenance guidelines, including but not limited to, the Board adopted Winter Maintenance Guidelines, the Board's standard practices and this Agreement. Should any dispute arise as to the character or extent of Maintenance or as to the City's performance hereunder, the controversy may be referred to an arbitration board consisting of the Road Commission for Oakland County Director of Highway Maintenance, the City of Farmington Engineer and a third person to be chosen by them for settlement thereof.

Π

The City agrees to keep said road in such condition as to be reasonably safe and convenient for public travel, in accordance with MCL 224.21, and to promptly notify the Board as soon as possible, but not longer than 5 days, should it become aware of defects or maintenance requirements in the roads set forth in Exhibit A, if said defects are not Maintenance subject to this Agreement.

The City shall keep accurate and uniform records of all Maintenance work performed pursuant to this Agreement. The Board shall have the right to audit City accounts and records insofar as such documents concern this Agreement and the work and services performed and to be performed hereunder.

III

In consideration of the assumption of Maintenance of Farmington Road, between Eight Mile and Grand River by the City, the Board agrees to pay the City the sum of \$21,451.33 as set forth in Exhibit A, attached hereto and made a part hereof. Such amount is to be used by the City for Maintenance.

Payments are to be made by the Board to the City as follows:

25% in December, 2016
25% in March, 2017
25% in June, 2017
25% in September, 2017

The making of said payments shall constitute Board's entire obligation in reference to said Maintenance.

IV

The City hereby agrees to hold harmless, represent, defend and indemnify the Board, the Road Commission for Oakland County, its officers, and employees the County of Oakland; the Office of the Oakland County Water Resources Commissioner and applicable drainage districts(s); the Michigan State Department of Transportation and the Transportation Commission; and any and all local units(s) of government within which the roads subject to this Agreement are located, against any and all claims, charges, complaints, damages, or causes of action for (a) public or private property damage, (b) injuries to persons (including death), or (c) other claims, charges, complaints, damages or causes of action arising out of

The City shall acquire and maintain, during the term of the Agreement, statutory worker's compensation insurance, employer's liability insurance, automobile and comprehensive general liability insurance coverages, as more fully described in Exhibit B attached hereto, covering the Board's liability for any and all claims arising out of the City's performance or non-performance of the activities which are the subject matter of this Agreement.

VI

The City further agrees to comply with all applicable laws and regulations, including without limitation, laws and regulations of the State of Michigan for safeguarding the air and waters of the State. In particular, City facilities and operations must meet the provisions of Part 5 (Spillage of Oil and Polluting Materials) rules promulgated pursuant to Part 31, Water Resources Protection, of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act, 1994 PA 451, as amended. (Rules R324.2001 through R324.2009 address release prevention planning, secondary containment, surveillance, and release reporting requirements). Further, the City must obtain DEQ permission to perform culvert replacements, when same involves a stream or lake. The City will be responsible for the proper disposal of the solid waste and other debris related to the maintenance described in Section I, and the costs associated therewith.

VII

In accordance with Michigan 1976 Public Acts No. 220 and 453, being MCLA §§37.1209 and 37.2209, as the same may be amended, the City and its subcontractors shall not discriminate against an employee or applicant for employment with respect to hire, tenure, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment, or matter directly or indirectly related to employment, because of race, color, religion, national origin, age, sex, height, weight, or marital status; or because of a disability that is unrelated to the individual's ability to perform the duties of a particular job or position. A breach of this covenant may be regarded as a material breach of this Agreement.

VIII

It is the intention of the parties hereto that this Agreement is not made for the benefit of any third party.

It is anticipated that subsequent agreements regarding Maintenance activities will be executed annually by the Parties hereto.

The terms and conditions of this Agreement shall become effective on October 1, 2016, and shall continue in full force and effect until a subsequent Maintenance agreement has been executed by the parties hereto or until this Agreement is terminated, as set forth below.

Insurance Coverage:

The City, prior to execution of the maintenance agreement, shall file with the Road Commission for Oakland County, copies of completed certificates of insurance as evidence that he carries adequate insurance satisfactory to the Board. Insurance coverage shall be provided in accordance with the following:

a. Worker's Compensation and Employer's Liability Insurance: The insurance shall provide worker's compensation protection for the City's employees, to the statutory limits of the State of Michigan, and provide Part B Employers Liability as follows:

- c. Excess and Umbrellas Insurance The City may substitute corresponding excess and/or umbrella liability insurance for a portion of the above listed requirements in order to meet the specified minimum limits of liability.

The City shall provide for and in behalf of the Road Commission for Oakland County and all agencies specified by the Road Commission, as their interest may appear, Owner's Protective Public Liability Insurance. Such insurance shall provide coverage and limits the same as the City's General Liability Insurance. Alternatively, the City may meet the requirements of this paragraph "d" by maintaining insurance with a liability limit of \$15,000,000.00 with no aggregate.
- e. Notice The City shall not cancel, renew, or non-renew the coverage of any insurance required by this Section without providing 30 day prior written notice to the Road Commission for Oakland County. All such insurance shall include an endorsement whereby the insurer shall agree to notify the Road Commission for Oakland County immediately of any reduction by the City. The City shall cease operations on the occurrence of any such cancellation or reduction, and shall not resume operations until new insurance is in force. If the City cannot secure the required insurance within 30 days, the Board reserves the right to terminate the Contract.
- f. Reports: The City or its insurance carrier shall promptly report to the Road Commission all of the following events each time as they occur: Claims received, claims investigations made, and disposition of claims.

See provisions of the maintenance agreement to which this Exhibit B is attached.

Description: Consideration to Approve SMART Agreement for Transfer of Municipal and Community Credits

Requested Action:

Move to authorize the City Manager to sign the agreement with SMART for Municipal Credits and Community Credits on behalf of the City for Fiscal Year 2017.

Background:

Each year the City enters into an agreement with the Suburban Mobility Authority for Regional Transportation (SMART) to receive municipal and community credits for local transportation programs. The Municipal Credits allocated to the City of Farmington for Fiscal Year 2017 are \$10,184. The allocation for Community Credits is \$13,136. There is no change in the Municipal or Community Credit amount from 2015. As in the past, the County would transfer credits to the Farmington Hills Senior Program Services to operate the Dial-A-Ride program.

In 1999, a Dial-A-Ride program was established for the cities of Farmington Hills and Farmington. The City of Farmington Hills Senior Services Division administers the program. The cities of Farmington Hills and Farmington annually transport approximately 6,000 persons through this Dial-A-Ride service using commercial cab companies. The administrations of both communities believe that this service is essential to our citizens and handicapped residents. As the program continues to be reviewed, additional services will be considered for inclusion to the regular transportation program.

I, <u>David M. Murphy</u>, as the <u>City Manager</u> of **City of Farmington** (hereinafter, the "Community") hereby apply to SMART and agree to the terms and conditions herein, for the receipt and expenditure of **Municipal Credits** (Section 1 below), and **Community Credits** (Section 2 below); and further agree that the **Municipal and Community Credits Master Agreement** between the parties is incorporated herein by reference. A description of the service the Community shall provide hereunder is set forth in Exhibit A, and the operating budget for that service is set forth in Exhibit B, both of which are attached hereto and incorporated herein.

1. The Community agrees to use \$ 10,184 in Municipal Credit funds as follows:

SMART intends to provide Municipal Credit funds under this contract to the extent funds for the program are made available to it by the Michigan Legislature pursuant to Michigan Public Act 51 of 1951. Municipal Credit funds made available to SMART through legislative appropriation are based on projected revenue estimates. In the event that revenue actually received is insufficient to support the Legislature's appropriation, it will result in an equivalent reduction in funding provided to the Community pursuant to this Contract. In such event, SMART reserves the right, without notice, to reduce the payment of Municipal Credit funds by the amount of any reduction by the legislature to SMART. All funding must be spent by September 30, 2018; all funds not spent by that date will revert back to SMART pursuant to Michigan Public Act 51 of 1951, for expenditure consistent with Michigan law and SMART policy.

Reimbursement for purchases made by Community requires submission of proper documentation to support the purchase (i.e. purchase orders, receiving reports, invoices, etc.). Community Credit dollars available in FY 2017, may be required to serve local employer transportation needs per the coordination requirements set forth in the aforementioned Master Agreement. All Community Credit funds must be spent by June 30, 2019 unless approval from SMART General Manager is obtained to extend Community Credits for an additional 2 years to allow accrual for major capital projects; any funds not spent by that date may revert back to SMART for expenditure consistent with SMART policy.

This agreement shall be binding once signed by both parties.

BID \$11,135

Quality Heating and Cooling said if its supplier for the HVAC units holds pricing, they will hold pricing on the unit. However, they typically see about a 3% increase in pricing annually. If that occurs, that would be passed along to us. The installation charges would remain constant. There was no request for a contractual agreement.

BID \$19,174

Diversified Heating and Cooling informed me that their original quote was their best quote and they would not be able to guarantee any prices in the future.

BID \$11,860

Perfect Temp. provided no response.
