#### 4. NEW BUSINESS

#### A. PROCLAMATION: NATIONAL RECOVERY MONTH - SEPTEMBER 2015

# Consideration to Adopt a Proclamation for Recognition of September 2015 as National Recovery Month

City Manager Murphy stated that Christy Nichols from the Office of Substance Abuse Services formally submitted a request to Farmington, as well as other Oakland County communities to approve a proclamation designating September as National Recovery Month to promote awareness about substance abuse and recovery.

McShane inquired if Call to Action Coalition was still active and Demers replied in the affirmative with a meeting set up for the second week in September and then their annual kick-off breakfast in October. He stated the Coalition's purpose is to provide a media to the community for those who need help who are struggling with substance use/abuse as well as family members of people who are struggling with substance abuse. They provide a hotline for people to call to get help and point them in the direction of resources and are essentially a community resource for people struggling with addiction and abuse.

Schneemann stated he had read that heroin use had spiked recently and Demers confirmed it and stated they had seen more cases within the last couple years. He indicated that the drug is readily available and costs about \$10 a gram and that there seemed to be an increase in the utilization of it as a form of a pain killer as it is cheaper than prescription drugs.

McShane commented that oftentimes people get hooked on prescription drugs and turn to illicit drugs to feed their addiction.

Galvin suggested that the proclamation be issued in the form of a press release and McShane stated a copy should be sent to the Call To Action Coalition.

Motion to adopt a proclamation recognizing September 2015 as National Recovery Month in the City of Farmington.

# B. Consideration to authorize the City Manager to sign the agreement with SMART for Municipal Credits and Community Credits on behalf of the City for Fiscal Year 2016

Murphy stated each year the City enters into an agreement with the Suburban Mobility Authority for Regional Transportation (SMART) to receive municipal and community credits for local transportation programs. The credit amount remains at \$10,184.00 and the community credits provides \$13,136.00. He provided a history of the Dial-A-Ride Program within the communities of Farmington/Farmington Hills.

Motion to authorize the City Manager to sign an agreement with SMART for Municipal Credits and Community Credits on behalf of the City for Fiscal Year 2016. [SEE ATTACHED CONTRACT].

Galvin informed Murphy that the Dial-A-Ride Program was expanded several years ago and that he may want to take a look at its components.

# C. CONSIDERATION TO ACCEPT THE RESIGNATION OF ELIZABETH TURTON FROM THE DOWNTOWN FARMINGTON PARKING ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Murphy stated Turton resigned from her position on the Parking Advisory Committee due to her move to Farmington Hills. He noted she held a resident position on the committee and also served as chairperson.

Cowley praised her input on the committee and requested Council consider either retaining her on the committee until her 2-year term expires; or allow

Farmington Hills residents to participate on Farmington Boards and Commissions.

Schneemann stated he would support retaining her on the committee to complete her term. He would also support allowing Farmington Hills residents to serve on Boards and Commissions.

McShane expressed opposition to Farmington Hills residents serving on Farmington Boards and Commissions. She raised a concern regarding a pattern of changing the rules to meet individual needs.

Scott concurred with McShane and noted historically residents have always served on the boards and commissions given they are the stakeholders of the city. He questioned what other alternatives may be available.

Galvin asked Attorney Schultz what the next steps would be if Council did not accept Turton's resignation.

Schultz advised that if Council wished her to remain on the committee, Council would need to adopt a resolution accordingly and an amendment must be made to the Parking Committee bylaws. He noted more formal boards like the Zoning Board of Appeals and Planning Commission would have far different ramifications. He said in order to keep a non-resident on the committee to complete her term, Council would need to direct City Administration to amend the committee bylaws and pass a resolution allowing her to fulfill her term.

Cowley spoke regarding the qualities and insight Turton brings to the committee. He confirmed she would be open to staying on the committee.

Responding to a question from McShane, Cowley indicated there are two resident positions on the committee.

McShane expressed concern over changing the rules. She indicated Council has not had enough time to carefully consider this issue.

Schneemann was comfortable making a decision because the Parking Committee is only an Ad Hoc Committee as indicated by Schultz.

Motion by Cowley to accept the resignation of Elizabeth Turton from the Downtown Farmington Parking Advisory Committee.

Motion failed for lack of support.

Motion by Cowley to allow Elizabeth Turton to fulfill her term on the Downtown Farmington Parking Advisory Committee; and direct City Administration to amend the bylaws and adopt a resolution accordingly.

### Motion failed for lack of support.

Scott stated he would like to know the definitive length or her remaining term before voting.

Motion to table the agenda item until the length of Turton's unexpired term on the Downtown Farmington Parking Advisory Committee is determined.

# D. Consideration to renew Farmington Road Maintenance Agreement with the Road Commission for Oakland County

City Administration recommended City Council approval to renew the Farmington Road Maintenance Agreement with the Road Commission for Oakland County. The annual agreement would be effective October 1, 2015. The City provides ordinary maintenance on Farmington Road between Eight Mile and Grand River.

Responding to a question from McShane, Eudy stated the city has not requested an increase in funding in the last three years. He stated his predecessor had made a request for additional funds and was denied.

Schneemann stated he would support a motion that included a request to Oakland County for more funds.

Discussion followed regarding opportunities to reduce road maintenance costs.

Motion to renew a Road Maintenance Agreement with the Road Commission for Oakland County with the provision that City Administration requests an increase in compensation.

City Administration provided background on the Narcotics Enforcement Team (NET) stating that the Farmington Public Safety Department assigns one officer to the team who works alongside others from agencies throughout Oakland County to investigate drug trafficking throughout the County and Southeastern Michigan. The Agreement is required from all participating NET agencies.

# F. Consideration to Approve Traffic Control Order- Additional 15 Minute Loading Zone on Thomas Street East of Farmington Road

City Administration stated that in an effort to alleviate congestion caused by delivery vehicles on Thomas Street, east of Farmington Road, the Parking Committee recommends the addition of a 15 minute loading zone to be located in an area behind the businesses at 23704 Farmington Road and 33338 Grand River Avenue. The Order will not be enforced until the sign is installed.

Responding to a question from Galvin, Demers stated the affected businesses are Cowley's and Farmington Shoe Repair.

McShane expressed concern that the loading zone would block traffic. Cowley stated the loading zone is needed to alleviate congestion and facilitate more deliveries in the right spot.

Motion to approve a resolution to amend Traffic Control Orders allowing an additional 15 minute loading zone on Thomas Street, east of Farmington Road. [SEE ATTACHED RESOLUTION].

## G. Consideration to Approve Traffic Control Order-Loading Zone on Thomas Street

City Administration advised that in an effort to alleviate congestion caused by delivery vehicles on Thomas Street west of Warner, and to allow for more efficient use of the north municipal parking lot, the parking committee is recommending an addition of a 15-minute loading zone to be located on the south side of Thomas Street along the north curb of the island located in the municipal lot behind 33316 Grand River Avenue. The committee requests Council approval of a resolution to amend Traffic Control Orders accordingly. The order will not be enforced until signage is installed.

Demers identified the site as being an island in the north parking lot directly north of the Basement Burger Bar. The committee is asking to replace the "no parking" sign along the island and making it a 15-minute loading zone. He stated this is another area where there has been bottlenecking of delivery trucks.

Scott expressed concern that cars will be blocked if this loading zone is approved.

Demers noted there is no established loading zone in the north lot. He stated drivers create their own way to make deliveries and this Traffic Order will establish one.

Scott indicated he needed more information before voting on this matter.

Christiansen stated the alternatives are to make no change and continue traffic congestion caused by the deliveries; or identify a loading area providing consistency in deliveries.

McShane suggested a trial period of six months for the Traffic Order and reevaluate it at the end of that period.

Motion to approve a resolution to amend Traffic Control Orders, establishing a loading zone in the municipal lot behind 33316 Grand River Avenue for a six month period. [SEE ATTACHED RESOLUTION].

# H. Consideration to Amend Traffic Control Order-Time Limited Parking Behind 33200 Grand River Avenue

City Administration advised that in an effort to better manage the available parking in downtown Farmington, the Parking Committee is recommending the addition of three-hour time-limited parking in the municipal lot behind 33200 Grand River Avenue. The Committee recommends approval of the proposed Traffic Control Amendment which will take effect when new signage is installed.

Galvin asked what business was located at 33200 Grand River and Demers responded Los Tres Amigos.

McShane asked regarding when signs would be posted informing people of the location of untimed parking.

Cowley responded the Committee will recommend location of signage at their September 23<sup>rd</sup> meeting. He stated no budget has been established. He advised a map will be included in the Main Street Messenger regarding

changes in downtown parking. He noted signage will be installed within 30-45 days. He went on to state this proposal has been presented to the DDA.

Galvin summarized the issues addressed by the Parking Committee are employee parking problems first and all else second; and Cowley agreed.

Cowley stated there are over 500 parking spots in the four untimed parking locations in which employees can park, including Masonic Temple, Farmington Library, Maxwell Training Center, and TJ Maxx. He stated TJ Maxx is allowing use of their lot for employee parking.

Motion to approve a resolution to amend Traffic Control Orders to establish time-limited parking behind 33200 Grand River Avenue. [SEE ATTACHED RESOLUTION].

# I. Consideration to Amend Traffic Control Order-Time Limited Parking on Grand River Avenue

City Administration advised that in an effort to better manage available parking in downtown Farmington, the Parking Committee is recommending that two-hour time limited parking currently on the north and south sides of Grand River Avenue be amended to one-hour time limited parking. The Committee recommends Council approval of a resolution formally approving the proposed traffic control order amendment which will take effect upon installation of signage.

Responding to a question from Galvin, Demers stated the Committee held significant discussion on this issue and determined that one-hour timed parking would create sufficient turnover for the street side parking spots.

Cowley stated they are trying to create turnover and this is not achieved with the current two hour timed parking.

Further discussion was held on the subject of educating the public on the time limits.

Schneemann stated he was uncertain that the change is needed on the Grand River parking.

Galvin asked why two hours is not working and Cowley cited the Walker Study that showed 90 minutes is optimum. He noted the Committee had

strong support for 30-minute parking for the sixteen spots along Grand River.

Scott noted the City's efforts in promoting foot traffic and that two-hour parking accommodated shoppers. He does not believe a change is needed at this time.

McShane discussed the hours of enforcement and who they impacted.

Murphy noted that most of the Committee endorsed 30-minute parking and City Administration struggled to increase it to an hour.

Galvin advised that more metrics should be supplied before a decision can be made on this item.

No motion was offered.

### J. Consideration to Authorize the Lease of 4 Multipurpose Printer/Copier/Scanner/Fax Machines and 1 Color Printer

City Administration recommended the lease of four multipurpose printer/copier/scan/fax machines and one color printer for a period of five years, where at the end of the lease the City will have the opportunity to continue leasing the equipment on a month-to-month basis, purchase the equipment at fair market value or return the equipment. This equipment will replace all devices in the City Hall and the DPW Building.

Discussion was held on the topic concerning costs and features.

#### 5. Other Business

#### A. Discuss MDOT Road Scoping Project – Jon Kramer, OHM

Christiansen provided background on the road scoping project that began with the Corridor Improvement Authority (CIA). Farmington engaged City

engineers in 2014 to prepare a traffic analysis which included evaluation of existing conditions on Grand River from Shiawassee through downtown east to Orchard Lake Road. The evaluation included a review of the physical condition of the road, assessing capacity and taking traffic counts to determine volumes. The evaluation report was shared with the CIA as well as City Council.

Christiansen stated following the evaluation report, the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) was engaged and a scoping project followed. MDOT issued a report that separated Grand River into three segments for project purposes. MDOT also gathered information from both cities as to what changes they would like to see made. He detailed some of the other findings in the report briefly.

Eudy explained MDOT's position on doing a full restoration.

Jon Kramer, from OHM, explained the scoping study process. He stated the project is in its early stages and it would probably be 2020 before the city sees any changes.

Eudy stated the study did touch on establishing bike lanes on Grand River from Farmington Road to Shiawassee area by changing the 10' lanes to 12'.

Scott summarized the report by stating that MDOT is focused on interchanges at Halstead and the area by Target and M-5. He stated the report does not address walkability issues and that "complete streets" needs to be addressed.

Further discussion was held on the project.

Kramer explained the criteria needed for MDOT.

Christiansen stated that the question is whether the city is willing to put in the funds to redo Grand River and what the city would be required to pay, i.e. for the study and resulting upgrades.

Eudy stated there are no funds provided in the MDOT report for Farmington to improve its water main or sanitary sewer. However, MDOT would freshen up the storm sewer, but not replace pipes.

Schneemann asked regarding the city's financial responsibility for the project. Murphy responded the city would be responsible for the study and for the upgrades to the water sewer mains.

Further discussion was held regarding projected costs.

Schneemann stated he was under the impression that if Farmington and Farmington Hills can reach an agreement regarding their goals for Grand

River, MDOT would be willing to go to proceed with a full reconstruction and takeback. Christiansen responded that possibility was discussed. Schneemann stated that that seems like an amazing opportunity for the city.

Scott stated that the city needs MDOT to incur the costs for the design stage.

Kramer stated the incentive for MDOT to perform the work on Grand River is the opportunity to turn it back over to the cities.

Further discussion was held regarding study costs.

Christiansen stated it is a positive move that MDOT met with both cities and is considering the request for turnover. They agreed to do the scoping study and incur the costs.

Galvin asked what two changes Council would like to make on Grand River in going through this process.

McShane stated a road diet, with walking/biking lane, and entertain the takeback of Grand River when costs are known.

Schneemann agreed with McShane that a road diet is critical and wants to see Grand River become more multi-modal and friendly.

Cowley was in agreement with McShane and Schneemann, but expressed concern regarding the unknown costs.

Scott stated road diet is number one and the ability to start the diet in the interim. He would like to start to move multi-modal and complete streets forward.

Galvin indicated he would like to see walkability west of Drake.

#### 7. Council Comment

McShane noted DTE is doing tree trimming in Royal Oak and Birmingham without following protocol. She asked how Farmington will prevent that from happening here.

McShane heard that a hydroponic store is planned for the Drakeshire Plaza. She questioned whether that is the type of business the city wants there.

Schneemann stated the importance of continuing to press our case with Farmington Hills and compel MDOT to move forward with changes to Grand River. He would like a clear understanding of the next steps that need to be taken.

Cowley indicated the Grand River project is similar to the steps taken with the Streetscape Project. He stated it is a combination of negotiation and metrics with the same challenge of how to cover the costs. He thanked Council for the strategy utilized in resolving the reappointment of Turton to the Parking Committee.

Galvin asked if the Mayor should serve on the Board of Directors for Chamber of Commerce or does the city want to maintain a seat, but not necessarily filled by the Mayor. He updated Council on the Farmington Hills City Manager search.

Murphy requested feedback on the draft of the Parks and Recreation Policy that was distributed to Council.

# 4. UPDATE OF THE MDOT SCOPING PROJECT FINAL REPORT MEETING - OHM

#### A. Update of the MDOT Scoping Project Final Report Meeting - OHM

Christiansen briefly reviewed the final MDOT Scoping Project Report for Grand River. He also discussed a recent MDOT meeting where the Scoping project was reviewed.

Scott advised that as MDOT has not identified funding, there is no money identified yet for the Grand River project. He stated MDOT is interested in turning Grand River over to the local agencies. Mayor Galvin inquired when this might occur, and Christiansen and

Scott indicated less than ten years. Mayor Galvin expressed concern about length of wait. Christiansen indicated that though there is no funding earmarked for these improvements, having the scoping and reports already done allows this project to be in the gueue for funding.

Beyond the scoping project: 2017 "mill and fill" of Grand River, 2018 Orchard Lake/Grand River signalization update. Scott confirmed that MDOT will consider an alternative striping configuration after the road improvement which will allow implementation of some of the complete street scenarios much quicker than was thought. 2016 will be a period for design, 2017 implementation and test of the road diet.

McShane wondered where the city will get money, Schneeman is concerned with making sure city administration does everything it needs to do to be sure advantage can be taken of the striping opportunity, Cowley inquired as to the commitment of Farmington Hills to make this a joint project.

Discussion concluded with a review of opportunities and possible concerns.

#### 5. UPDATE OF RECREATION MASTER PLAN

### A. Consideration of LSL Proposal for City of Farmington Recreation Master PLan update

Murphy presented the update of the recreation master plan. A review of the 2015-16 budget that has money in it for a Parks and Recreation plan was disbursed, as well as an attachment from LSL Planning outlining their proposal for the update.

Christiansen spoke on the need and desire to update 2005-2009 Recreation master plan in light of changes in existing conditions plus the addition of a neighborhood park on the Flanders School site.

Malloy-Marcon presented the LSL proposal and its projected budget.

Christiansen requested that a subcommittee be formed that consists of five members: representatives from Council, planning commission, DDA, residents, and a representative of the user base such as the South Farmington Baseball, Inc. group. McShane suggested representatives from the YMCA and the Schools be included in the subcommittee and also inquired about the time frame. Christiansen responded that recommendations for the subcommittee could be presented at next meeting in October, and have a completion focus of six months. Galvin proposed a public engagement meeting be included in the plan, and requested that Farmington's diverse population also be included in the public feedback phase of the project.

### 6. REVIEW OF PROPOSED OFFERS TO PURCHASE OLD COURTHOUSE

### A. Review of Proposal and Purchase Agreement for Old Courthouse Property

Present: Dan Blugerman, Thomas A. Duke Company

Mayor Galvin introduced a review of proposed offers to purchase the Old Courthouse Property. Schneemann recused himself from the conversation, Galvin accepted. Schneemann explained that his architectural firm is representing one of the site

developers and left the meeting.

Christiansen quickly reviewed the proposal from the Thomas A. Duke Company. He gave a short overview of the history of the plans for the property, and moved into a description of the two proposed uses: as an attached single-family project or a detached single family traditional neighborhood.

Galvin inquired whether the project is different from other projects since a Request for Proposal (RFP) was not sent out. Blugerman responded that this is more a solicitation of offers and marketing efforts by the realtors. Per Blugerman's interpretation of the Vision Plan, offers for reuse of the building have been discouraged, filtering offers to those proposing a residential project. There are more projects in the background, but Blugerman feels that the two present proposals are most consistent with the plan. Schultz referenced a formal document adopted by the City Council that sets forth the goals and the basis of review, but indicated there is no particular RFP out.

Murphy requested that this topic come back to City Council in one week at the Economic Development meeting. Christiansen will get more information about both plans. Galvin advised administration to use the past document as referenced by Schultz as a guideline for preparation for the review in one week.

Cowley asked about density of both options. Christiansen summarized both projects and agrees that the duplex plan yields the most density. McShane requested that Christiansen find out the tax benefit of both projects. Christiansen agreed to do so.

Galvin requested that Christiansen talk to the developers re: the School's future plan for adjacent property. Christiansen discussed connectivity and road plans.

## 5. REVIEW PROPOSED PURCHASE AGREEMENTS FOR OLD COURTHOUSE PROPERTY

# A. Review of Proposal and Purchase Agreement for Old Courthouse Property

Present: Dan Blugerman, Thomas A. Duke Company

Schneemann recused himself from discussion on this Agenda Item.

Christiansen advised currently there are two interested parties in the courthouse property. He discussed a draft purchase agreement that includes demolition of the courthouse and preparation of the site for a new single family detached residential redevelopment.

Blugerman advised the asking price in the agreement is \$425,000 with a \$20,000 down payment. He stated the proposed development would include nineteen units with a central courtyard in a price range of \$220,000 - \$240,000.

Discussion followed regarding the design of the proposed development.

Scott raised concerns regarding groundwater problems and questioned whether research had been done to address the issue. He requested tax information regarding the proposed development.

Cowley asked regarding the target demographic for the property. Christiansen responded younger professionals with no children or beginning a young family.

Discussion followed regarding a common mailbox kiosk and issues of mail delivery.

Galvin thanked Christiansen and Blugerman for their presentation. He then invited the next applicants to the table for discussion.

Joe Capozzoli, Paladin Advisors LLC, presented a proposal, Hillcrest Village, that would include 24 ranch style condominiums, ranging from 1,400 to 1,680 square feet, targeted to empty nesters.

Scott requested clarification on ranch versus non-ranch models. Capozzoli directed him to the website <a href="www.Hillcrestvillage-farmington.com">www.Hillcrestvillage-farmington.com</a> to review floorplans and further discussion was held.

Cowley stated Phase I posed no problem to him but asked what was proposed for Phase II and III and discussion followed. He then inquired about the headcount for the project. Capozzoli responded the ranch condominiums would bring in about 100 residents and the townhomes approximately 125.

Cowley expressed concern that an additional 200 to 250 people living in that area may pose traffic problems.

Capozzoli then gave his vision of what the property could potentially be and discussion followed.

Cowley then stated he would like to see family density for this project that would increase the school population.

Responding to a question from McShane, Capozzoli stated the price range for the units would be \$275,000 to \$300,000. He described the targeted demographic that provided a basis for the price range.

Discussion followed regarding green space and different phases of the proposed development.

Galvin thanked Capozzoli for his presentation.

Kevin asked Council for further comments.

Scott said he was concerned with the price point differences.

Cowley stated he would lean towards a development that targeted a younger demographic.

McShane stated she liked both concept plans and that the condos might attract young people who aren't ready to buy. She agreed with Cowley's point of planning for density in that area.

Galvin noted a formal RFP has not been sent out and perhaps that should be done and a deadline set.

Scott stated both plans have their merits, but would like to see more detail provided. He is anxious to keep this redevelopment moving forward. He believes the duplex concept is a higher quality development. He would like to see a deadline established.

Galvin stated he doesn't feel the necessity for a deadline, but he had more of a sense of urgency on the project and further discussion was held.

Christiansen defined the area known as "Development Area D" and what some of the challenges might be in its development.

Galvin asked Council to review the proposed plans along with the Vision Plan and Master Plan and determine the direction of the redevelopment.

(Schneemann returned to Council Chambers at 8:50 p.m.)

#### 6. CONSIDERATION TO ACCEPT DOWNTOWN AREA PLAN

Christiansen advised the Downtown Area Plan was introduced at the June 15, 2015 Planning Commission meeting and adopted at their July 13, 2015 meeting. # C. Recognition of JoAnne McShane for her 26 years of service to Farmington

Commissioner Bill Dwyer, on behalf of the Oakland County Commissioners, presented Councilmember McShane with a proclamation in recognition of her service and commitment to the community.

State Senator Gregory and State Representative Greig presented a special tribute to Councilmember McShane.

Cowley congratulated McShane on all of her years of service. He has always respected her position on issues and her passion for the City.

Schneemann stated McShane has been an inspiration to him and she is one of the reasons he joined City Council. She sets a wonderful example of effective community leadership. She always had the best interest of those in the community, including those who have little or no voice.

Scott noted McShane has attended over 800 meetings during her tenure on Council----a significant commitment to the citizens of our community. In addition to Council meetings, he noted all of the other additional meetings she has attended in serving on Boards, Commissions and other organizations. He stated her level of volunteerism is amazing. He asked her to look around at all her successes and accomplishments. He thanked her for her support, guidance and insight over the past two years he has served on Council.

Galvin thanked her family for allowing her to give all the hours to the city. He stated the one thing he has learned the most from her is to respectfully disagree and continue to

McShane stated the City has consistently maintained its AA bond rating. She is proud of the fact that the City maintained a stable financial condition through significant financial and economic challenges and set the stage for future economic development.

McShane stated her focus has always been to maintain City services without increasing the millage, provide strong fiscal management and ensure a safe and vibrant community. She is proud to say Farmington has been a small City with big ideas and a big heart.

McShane thanked everyone who helped to create the lovely party she had on October 11th. She thanked the wonderful City employees, including administrative staff, City Manager's office, exceptional Public Safety Department and the department of Public Services. She is proud to say Farmington has been a very stable City with long term employees and outstanding volunteers.

McShane stated these 26 years have included some of the most amazing and rewarding experiences of her life. In closing, she thanked everyone who has enriched her life and given her the courage, support, and love she needed to serve the community and be the most dedicated Farmington advocate she could possibly be.

A video from former City Manager Pastue was shown in which he recognized her commitment and service to the community.

Eudy congratulated McShane on her retirement. He spoke about her encouraging smile at his first Council meeting that gave him the ability to relax and address Council.

Eudy announced leaf pick-up will begin the following Monday morning on October 26th.

He spoke about delivering the Council packet to her residence when he was new to the department and how she was always warm and welcoming. He thanked her for the tremendous support she has always given to his department. He wished her the best in health and happiness in her retirement.

Weber wished McShane good luck in her retirement. He thanked her for always supporting employees even through the tough financial times. He thanked her for her involvement in the Schools.

### MONTHLY REPORT OCTOBER 2015

#### **SOLICITORS**

- -Officers handed out treats to children trick-or-treating on Halloween night. The Halloween Safety Patrol is an annual event.

#### Background:

The City's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding for 2016 is projected by Oakland County to be \$22,141. As part of the application process, the city must hold a public hearing. Our completed application, accompanied by a resolution of Council approval, must be submitted to Oakland County by December 18, 2015.

As Council knows, CDBG funding eligibility is restricted to projects or programs that meet specific objectives determined by the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Of these objectives, Farmington is limited to CDBG funding for projects where "the primary beneficiaries are low or moderate income people."

Council may recall from previous years' CDBG applications that senior programs/projects receive special eligibility consideration. The administration's preliminary recommendation, outlined below, proposes a CDBG program that is not administratively burdensome, and continues current city funding level for the senior center and senior services.

CDBG funds are federal funds administered by the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The administration's preliminary recommendation is that Council considers establishing the following development objectives: (1) senior center and (2) public services (senior services). The administration proposes allocating \$15,499 for senior center and \$6,642 for public services (senior services).

#### AMENDED AND RESTATED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF RESOURCE RECOVERY AND RECYCLING AUTHORITY OF SOUTHWEST OAKLAND COUNTY

(Adopted July, 1989; Amended November, 1989; Amended November, 1990; Amended \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2015)

These Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation are adopted by the incorporating municipal corporations for the purpose of continuing an AUTHORITY under the provisions of Act 179, Public Acts of Michigan, 1947, as amended (the "Act").

#### **ARTICLE I**

The name of this AUTHORITY is "Resource Recovery and Recycling Authority of Southwest Oakland County." The principal office of the AUTHORITY will be located at 20000 W. Eight Mile Road, Southfield, MI 48075. The principal office of the AUTHORITY may be changed from time to time as determined by resolution of the Board of Trustees.

#### **ARTICLE II**

The initial Incorporating Municipalities creating this AUTHORITY were the Cities of Farmington, Farmington Hills, Novi, South Lyon, Southfield, and Walled Lake, all designated as the CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITIES. The City of Wixom and the Charter Township of Lyon were subsequently added as CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITIES. Upon the approval of these Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation on \_\_\_\_\_\_\_\_, 2015, the Village of Milford and the Charter Township of Milford are designated as CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITIES, and the Charter Township of Lyon shall be considered withdrawn from the AUTHORITY. All CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITIES are located in the County of Oakland, State of Michigan.

#### **ARTICLE III**

The purpose of this AUTHORITY is the collection or disposal, or both, of garbage or rubbish, or both, and to acquire, construct, own, improve, enlarge, repair, remodel, extend, maintain and operate a waste management project or system, in accordance with the authorization of the Act or of any other applicable statute.

#### ARTICLE IV

This AUTHORITY shall be a body corporate with power to sue or to be sued in any court of this State. The AUTHORITY shall be comprised of the territory within the corporate boundaries of its CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITIES. No change in municipal jurisdiction over any territory within the AUTHORITY shall in any manner affect the AUTHORITY or its boundaries. It shall possess all of the powers now or hereafter granted by the Act or by any other applicable statute and by these Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation, and those incident thereto, including specifically, but not limited to, the power to manage billing, collection contracts and franchises, to operate or manage transfer facilities, or to operate or manage

recycling facilities or any other facilities permitted by law, either within or without its corporate limits. The enumeration of any powers herein shall not be construed as a limitation upon its general powers unless the context shall clearly indicate otherwise. The AUTHORITY shall have a corporate seal.

#### ARTICLE V

This AUTHORITY shall continue in existence perpetually or until dissolved by act of the parties or by law; provided, however, that such AUTHORITY shall not be dissolved if such dissolution could operate as an impairment of any of its contracts.

#### **ARTICLE VI**

The fiscal year of the AUTHORITY shall commence on the first day of July in each year and end on the last day of June next following. The fiscal year of the AUTHORITY may be changed from time to time as determined by resolution of the Board of Trustees.

#### **ARTICLE VII**

The governing body of this AUTHORITY shall be a Board of Trustees, hereinafter referred to as the BOARD, which shall be made up of one voting representative from each CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY. Members of the BOARD shall be the respective Chief Administrative Officer of each of the CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITIES. Each Member of the BOARD shall also appoint an alternate member who may attend meetings of the BOARD but may vote only in the absence of the Trustee having appointed the alternate. In no event shall the term of the alternate member extend beyond the term of the individual Trustee having appointed the alternate.

The members of the BOARD and such officers thereof who also are members of the BOARD shall be paid no compensation; provided, however, that the BOARD may authorize the payment of the actual expenditures of any member or officer incurred in connection with the business of the AUTHORITY. The BOARD shall meet on the third Wednesday of July of each year at 8:30 o'clock a.m., at the place of holding the meetings of the BOARD, or at such other time and place as the BOARD may determine from time to time by resolution, for the purpose of organization. At such organization meeting the BOARD shall select a Chairman and a Vice-Chairman, who shall be members of the BOARD, and a Secretary and a Treasurer, who may but need not be members of the BOARD determines appropriate, who may but need not be members of the BOARD. Such officers shall serve until the organization meeting in the following year or until their respective successors shall be selected and qualify.

Within thirty (30) days after the initial organization of the AUTHORITY shall become effective, the members of the BOARD shall meet for the purpose of organizing the BOARD for the balance of such fiscal year. The time and place for such meeting shall be fixed by a majority of the members-elect of the BOARD, and notice thereof served upon all members in the manner provided in Article IX. No selection of an officer of the BOARD shall be deemed to be invalid because it was not made within or at the time specified in these Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation.

#### **ARTICLE VIII**

In the event of a vacancy in a position of Chief Administrative Officer of a CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY, the legislative body of such CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY shall promptly appoint a representative to the Board on an interim basis, to serve until such time as the vacancy in the position of Chief Administrative Officer shall be filled.

In the event of a vacancy in any office of the BOARD, such vacancy shall be filled by the BOARD for the unexpired term. In case of the temporary absence or disability of any officer, the BOARD may appoint some person temporarily to act in his or her stead except that in the event of the temporary absence or disability of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman shall so act.

#### **ARTICLE IX**

Meetings of the BOARD shall be held at least quarterly, and may be held more often, at such time and place as shall be prescribed by resolution of the BOARD. Special meetings of the BOARD may be called by the Chairman or any two members thereof, by serving written notice of the time, place and purpose thereof, upon each member of the BOARD personally, or by leaving it at his or her place of residence at least eighteen hours prior to the time of such meeting, or by depositing the same in a United States Post Office or mail box within the limits of the AUTHORITY, at least seventy-two hours prior to the time of such meeting, enclosed in a sealed envelope properly addressed to him or her at his or her home or office address, with first class postage fully prepaid. Special meetings of the BOARD at which all members are present shall be deemed to be valid even though no written notice thereof may be given as above specified. Any member of the BOARD may waive notice of any meeting either before or after the holding thereof.

At least a majority of the members-elect of the BOARD shall be required for a quorum. Each member of the BOARD shall have one vote on all matters before the BOARD, except as provided below. On any matter requiring a weighted vote, the number of votes to which each member of the BOARD shall from time to time be entitled shall be calculated by multiplying (i) the quotient, carried to four decimal places, obtained by dividing (A) the total number of tons of solid waste delivered from the CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY to the AUTHORITY during the preceding fiscal year by (B) the total number of tons of solid waste delivered from all CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITIES to the AUTHORITY during the preceding fiscal year, times (ii) 100; provided, however, that no member of the BOARD shall be entitled to more than 49.00% of the total weighted vote eligible to be cast.

In the event that the operation of the formula set forth above would result in one member of the BOARD being entitled to more than 49.00% of the total weighted vote eligible be cast, that member shall be assigned exactly 49.00% of the total weighted vote eligible to be cast, and the number of votes to which each remaining member shall be entitled shall be calculated by multiplying (iii) the quotient obtained by the formula described in part (i) above excepting that the tonnage of solid waste of the CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY represented by the member possessing 49.00% of the total weighted vote shall be subtracted from the denominator described in part (i)(B) above, times (iv) 100, times (v) 51.00%.

For the passage of any resolution or ordinance establishing, imposing or levying rates, charges or fees to users or beneficiaries of the service or services furnished by the solid waste management system, providing for the issuance of bonds, (iii) authorizing the execution of any contract, or (iv) appointing or removing the General Manager, there shall be required a vote of 50% of the members-elect of the BOARD and a majority of the weighted vote of the members-elect of the BOARD. For the passage of any resolution or ordinance establishing the location of disposal facilities, there shall be required a 67% vote of the members-elect of the BOARD and 67% of the weighted vote of the members-elect of the BOARD. For all other matters, a vote of a majority of the members of the BOARD present at any meeting at which a quorum is present shall be sufficient for passage.

Public notices of all regular, special or rescheduled regular meetings of the BOARD shall be given pursuant to the applicable provisions of The Open Meetings Act, being Act 267, Public Acts of 1976, as amended from time to time.

The BOARD shall have the right to adopt rules governing its procedure which are not in conflict with the terms of any statute or of these Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation. The BOARD shall also have the right to establish rules and regulations for the use of any project constructed by it under the provisions of the enabling acts. The BOARD shall keep a journal of its proceedings, which shall be signed by the Secretary. All votes shall be "yeas" and "nays", except that where the vote is unanimous, it shall only be necessary to so state.

#### ARTICLE X

The Chairman of the BOARD shall be the presiding officer thereof. Except as herein otherwise provided, he shall not have any executive or administrative functions other than as a member of said BOARD. In the absence or disability of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman shall perform the duties of the Chairman. The Secretary shall be the recording officer of the BOARD. The Treasurer shall be custodian of the funds of the AUTHORITY. All money shall be deposited in a bank to be designated by the BOARD. The BOARD shall adopt by resolution such procedures for the execution of checks or other forms of withdrawal, for the investment of funds and for such other budgeting and accounting measures, as the BOARD deems appropriate. The officers of the BOARD shall have such other powers and duties as may be conferred upon them by the BOARD.

Bonds issued by the AUTHORITY, and interest coupons relating thereto, if any, shall be executed in the name and on behalf of the AUTHORITY by its Chairman or Vice-Chairman and countersigned by its Secretary or Assistant Secretary by manual or facsimile signature, and the corporate seal of the AUTHORITY or a facsimile thereof shall be printed on or affixed to bonds.

The BOARD shall prepare, adopt and submit to their respective legislative bodies an annual budget covering the proposed expenditures to be made for the organizing and operating of the AUTHORITY and for the necessary funds required from each CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY for the next fiscal year, beginning July 1, 1989, such budget to be submitted to each CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY on or before May 1 of each calendar year. No budget shall be adopted unless approved by a vote of 50% of the members-elect of the BOARD and by a majority of the weighted vote of the members-elect of the BOARD; provided, however, that no obligation shall be assumed by the AUTHORITY which may then or at any time in the future become in whole or in part the individual liability of any CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY

without the prior individual consent of that CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY; and provided further, that any CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY may withdraw from the AUTHORITY at any time prior to the incurrence of indebtedness by the AUTHORITY for which the CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY may incur an individual liability without any obligation whatever, and may also withdraw after the assumption of indebtedness by the AUTHORITY for which the individual CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY has by its prior agreement thereto incurred an individual liability, but in such latter withdrawal the consent of the creditor shall be obtained or the individual obligation assumed by the withdrawing member shall be paid by the withdrawing CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY on terms satisfactory to the creditor.

The provisions of this Article shall be considered controlling over all other Articles of this instrument.

#### ARTICLE XI

The BOARD may appoint a General Manager. The General Manager shall be the chief administrative officer of the AUTHORITY, and shall perform all of the purely administrative functions of the AUTHORITY, unless otherwise delegated in these Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation. All such functions shall be performed in harmony with the adopted policies of the BOARD. The General Manager shall serve at the will of the BOARD and may be removed at any time by resolution of the BOARD.

#### **ARTICLE XII**

The AUTHORITY shall possess all powers necessary to carry out the purposes thereof and those incident thereto. It may acquire private property by purchase, lease, gift, devise or condemnation, either within or without its corporate limits, and may hold, manage, control, sell, exchange or lease such property. For the purpose of condemnation it may proceed under the provisions of Act 149, Public Acts of Michigan, 1911, as now or hereafter amended, or, any other appropriate statute.

#### ARTICLE XIII

The AUTHORITY shall have the power to determine the location of any project constructed by it under the provisions of the Act and to determine, in its discretion the design, standards, and the materials of construction, and construct, maintain, repair and operate the same.

#### **ARTICLE XIV**

The AUTHORITY may contract with any person, firm or corporation for the performance by the latter of any part of the work of collecting or disposing of garbage or rubbish. The AUTHORITY and its CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITIES may enter into a contract or contracts providing for the acquisition, purchase, construction, improvement, enlargement, extension, operation and financing of a solid waste management system as authorized and provided by law. The AUTHORITY may enter into contracts with any non-constituent county, city, village, township or charter township for the furnishing of solid waste management service by any system owned or operated by the AUTHORITY, which contract shall provide for reasonable charges or rates for such service furnished. The AUTHORITY shall have the power to enter into contracts with any CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY or other

municipality for the purchase of solid waste management services from such CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY or other municipality. No contracts shall be for a period exceeding thirty years.

#### ARTICLE XV

For the purpose of obtaining funds for the acquisition, construction, improving, enlarging or extending of facilities for the collection or disposal or both of garbage or rubbish or both, or a waste management system, or for the purpose of refunding bonds previously issued, the AUTHORITY may, upon ordinance or resolution duly adopted by it, issue its self-liquidating revenue bonds in accordance with the provisions of Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended, being Sections 141.101 to 141.139, inclusive, of the Michigan Compiled Laws, or any other act providing for the issuance of revenue bonds, which bonds shall be payable solely from the revenues of the AUTHORITY. The charges specified in any such contract or contracts shall be subject to increase by the AUTHORITY at any time if necessary in order to provide funds to meet its obligations. Any contract authorized herein shall be for a period of not exceeding forty (40) years.

#### **ARTICLE XVI**

The BOARD shall have power to hire all necessary officers and employees to carry out the functions of the AUTHORITY and to fix the compensation therefor; provided, however, that no officer or employee of any CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY shall receive any compensation from the AUTHORITY except by the unanimous vote of the members of the BOARD. It is further understood that the BOARD may contract with any CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY or some outside governmental agency for the purpose of examining and preparing an eligible register of prospective employees for the several classifications of officers and employees needed to operate such facilities.

#### ARTICLE XVII

The BOARD shall cause an annual audit to be made of its financial transactions by a certified public accountant and shall furnish a copy thereof to each CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY.

#### ARTICLE XVIII

If any CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY shall refuse or neglect to enter into a contract for, or otherwise cause, the disposal of its garbage and rubbish, or both, through the facilities determined by the BOARD, then the BOARD by the weighted vote of the members-elect possessing at least 67% of the total weighted vote eligible to be cast, may expel such municipality as a constituent part of the AUTHORITY. The BOARD may not modify or cancel any contract upon which its revenues are based, if the same would impair the obligation of any bond contract.

#### ARTICLE XIX

These Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation shall be published once in the Detroit News/Free Press of Detroit, Michigan, which newspaper has general circulation within

the territory encompassed by the AUTHORITY. One printed copy of the Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation as printed in the aforementioned newspaper, certified as a true copy thereof as hereinafter provided, with the date and place of publication shown by a publisher's affidavit of publication attached thereto, shall be filed with each of the Secretary of State and the Clerk of the County of Oakland after the execution and publication thereof has been completed.

The Director of Public Services of the City of Novi is hereby designated as the person to cause these Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation to be published, certified and filed as aforesaid. In the event he or she shall be unable to act or shall neglect to act, then the City Manager of the City of Farmington shall act in his or her stead.

#### ARTICLE XX

This AUTHORITY shall become effective upon the filing of certified copies of these Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation, as provided in the preceding Article XIX.

#### ARTICLE XXI

These Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation may be amended at any time so as to permit any county, city, village, township, or charter township to become a member of this AUTHORITY, if such amendment to and these Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation are adopted by the legislative body of such county, city, village, township or charter township proposing to become a member, and if such amendment is adopted by the legislative body of each CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY of which the AUTHORITY is composed. Other amendments may be made to these Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation at any time if adopted by the legislative body of each CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY of which the AUTHORITY is composed. Any such amendment shall be endorsed, published, and certified and printed copies thereof filed in the same manner as the original Articles of Incorporation, except that the filed and printed copies shall be certified by the recording officer of this AUTHORITY.

THESE AMENDED AND RESTATED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION have been adopted by the incorporating municipalities, as hereinafter set forth in the following endorsements, and in witness whereof the designated officials of each CONSTITUENT MUNICIPALITY have endorsed thereon the statement of such adoption.

**<u>Description:</u>** Farmington Welcome and Wayfinding Signage - Acceptance of Proposal

#### **Requested Action:**

Accept proposal from Universal Sign Systems for the manufacture and installation of Farmington Welcome and Wayfinding Signage in the amount of \$59,455.72.

#### **Background:**

Per a request for proposals, the City of Farmington received three bids for the manufacture and installation of welcome and wayfinding signage (see attached specifications) including (4) welcome signs, (5) historic district signs and multiple wayfinding and/or car and bike parking directional signage throughout the community.

Proposals were received from the following bidders in the following amounts:

Universal Sign Systems \$59,455.72 Valley City Signs \$77,180.34 Signs by Crannie \$95,700.00

After discussion with design firm Grissim Metz Andriesse and verification of satisfactory performance with prior work in the Cities of Novi and Fenton, we recommend award of the bid for the welcome and wayfinding signage project to Universal Sign Systems. Ms. Sue Grissim reviewed the bids for completion and accuracy; she indicated that she has worked with Universal Sign Systems in the past with acceptable results. Representatives from Novi and Fenton shared positive remarks about the outcomes of their respective projects.

The Farmington Downtown Development Authority has budgeted \$20,000 toward signs to be installed within the DDA district. It is expected that the DDA will review this item at its December 2, 2015 meeting to obligate its portion of the funding to the City.

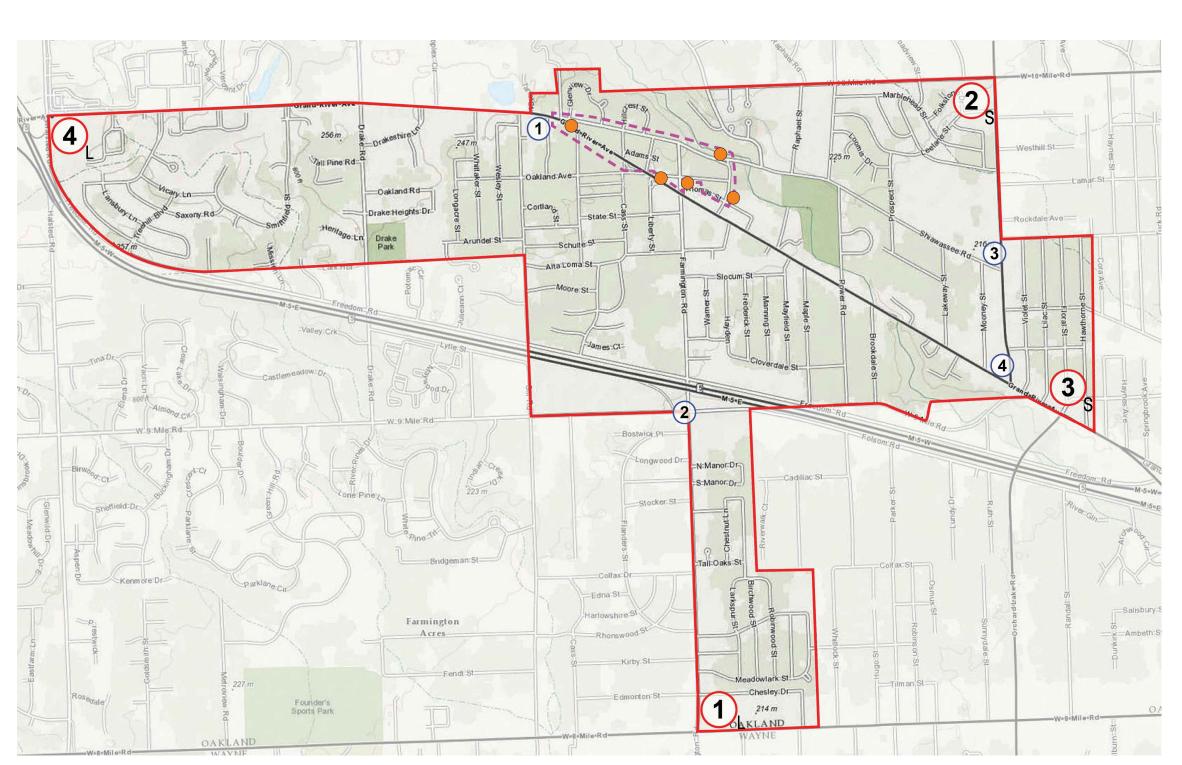

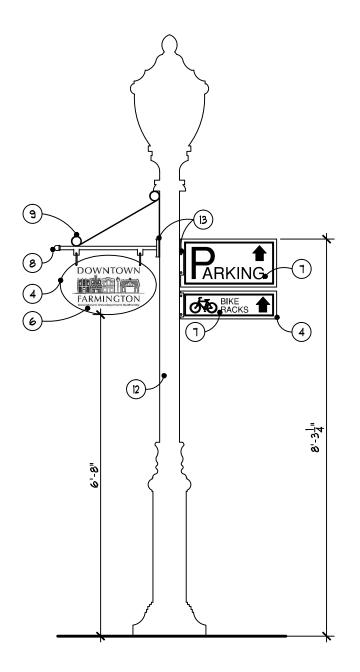

#### **Requested Action:**

Move to decline the offer to purchase at this time.

#### Background:

The City has received an offer to purchase the former 47<sup>th</sup> District Court courthouse property on Ten Mile Road east of Farmington. Council will recall that the City had entered into a purchase agreement for the property with Balfour Farmington a few years ago for a purchase price of \$425,000. The agreement required Balfour to submit a development proposal to the City within 90 days and included a good faith deposit of \$20,000 that was only refundable if the City failed to approve the development. The City did approve the development but Balfour eventually declined to move forward with the purchase.

The proposed purchase agreement from Blueduck is similar to the Balfour agreement but has some different provisions, including a 6-month financing contingency, requiring the property to be "off the market" while Blueduck tries to find financing for the purchase and some restrictions on the City's right to reject the development proposal. In addition, the proposed \$20,000 good faith deposit is fully refundable to Blueduck up until the approval of a development by the City.

The City Manager and Economic and Community Development Director have been informed that there are other potential purchasers inquiring about the property. In light of the fact that Blueduck does not appear to have a significant history of developing properties such as this, and no financing yet, at this time, the City administration believes that it would be appropriate to wait to see what comes of those inquiries, which may include an opportunity to seek a higher purchase price.

#### CITY OF FARMINGTON BLUEDUCK HOLDINGS, LLC SALE OF LAND AGREEMENT

THIS SALE OF LAND AGREEMENT, made and entered into this \_\_\_\_\_ day of October, 2015, by and between the City of Farmington, a Michigan municipal corporation, whose address is 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan 48335 (the "City"), and Blueduck Holdings, LLC, a Michigan limited liability company, whose address is 37637 Five Mile Road Box 269 Livonia, MI 48154 ("Blueduck").

#### R-E-C-I-T-A-L-S:

- A. City is the owner of a certain parcel of real estate located in Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, a legal description of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and made a part hereof (the "Property"), at which location the 47<sup>th</sup> District Court previously operated in the building on the Property. The building is now vacant;
  - B. Blueduck desires to acquire the Property for development and sale (hereinafter the "Project";
- C. City desires to sell the Property to Blueduck, or a permitted assign of Blueduck as described herein, in consideration for payment of the Purchase Price and compliance with the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement; and
  - D. City and Blueduck desire to set forth their agreement in writing.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements for each party to the other hereinafter set forth, Blueduck and the City agree as follows:

- 1. For the Purchase Price and subject to the terms and conditions contained in this Agreement, City agrees to sell to Blueduck, and Blueduck agrees to purchase from City, the Property. For all purposes hereunder, the term "Property" shall incorporate the land described on Exhibit A.
- 2. The "Purchase Price" for the Property shall be Four Hundred Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$425,000.00) to be paid via wire transfer or certified funds to the City at the Closing. Blueduck's obligation to close is contingent upon its obtaining financing in an amount and upon terms satisfactory to Blueduck to complete the Project (the "Contingency"). Blueduck has been seeking financial commitments and will diligently continue that effort, and on the effective date of this Agreement, will pay the sum of \$20,000 to the city as a Good Faith deposit that will be fully refunded if the Project does not proceed for any reason or no reason at all. Blueduck will remove that Contingency on or before 6 months from the effective date of this Agreement unless the parties agree, in writing, to extend it.
- 3. As evidence of title, City agrees, at City's sole cost and expense, to furnish Blueduck, as soon as possible, but in no event later than thirty (30) days after the date hereof, a title commitment from Seaver Title Insurance Corporation (the "Title Company") without exceptions, along with copies of all back-up documentation. City will issue to Blueduck, at or as soon as possible after Closing, its standard form of Owner's Title Insurance Policy, in the amount of the Purchase Price, insuring title to the Property to be in good and marketable condition, without exceptions. If Blueduck notifies City in

writing within fifteen (15) days after the date of receipt of the title commitment that the title is not in the condition required for performance hereunder, City agrees to provide Blueduck with a revised title commitment that is acceptable to Blueduck. If City is unable to provide an acceptable title commitment after using reasonable efforts within said thirty (30)-day period, Blueduck shall have a period of ten (10) days thereafter to elect in writing to either (a) proceed with this transaction, or (b) to terminate this Agreement and to immediately receive a full reimbursement from the City of the Security Deposit and all costs incurred by Blueduck prior to such failure as its sole and exclusive remedy and without further liability on the part of either party. Failure of Blueduck to timely elect an option shall be deemed to mean that Blueduck has elected to proceed.

- 4. As soon as possible, but in no event later than ninety (90) days after the Contingency is removed, Blueduck agrees, at its sole cost and expense, to fully and completely submit an application for approval of a Planned Unit Development ("PUD") on the Property that complies with City ordinance requirements for PUDs and that contains all permits, plans, maps, elevations, details and information required under the City's Zoning Ordinance and other applicable ordinances and necessary to commence construction of the Project. Such application for PUD approval shall substantially conform to the conceptual plans and narrative submitted as part of the Proposal submitted by Blueduck to the City, attached hereto as Exhibit C. Following submittal of such application, Blueduck shall supplement its application materials as necessary to address issues, if any, raised by the Planning Commission and City Council upon review and shall continuously pursue approval of said PUD. Blueduck understands and agrees that it shall be required to comply with all applicable City ordinances and partake in one or more public hearings concerning its PUD proposal, and that except as set forth herein, this Agreement in no way constitutes, nor shall it be construed or interpreted to constitute, approval or a promise to approve the PUD or any development of any portion of the Property. Both parties agree to proceed in good faith throughout the application process and the City agrees that approval of the application and necessary permits shall not be unreasonably withheld. If at any time the City reasonably concludes that Blueduck has failed to comply with this paragraph, it may give Blueduck specific written notice of such failure. Upon receipt of such notice Blueduck shall have 2 business days to dispute the alleged failure. If the issue is not resolved within 5 days following the notice of the dispute City may give Blueduck 30 business days to cure. If the issue has not been resolved to the City's satisfaction within that period, the City may declare this Agreement to be without further force and effect and the Good Faith Deposit shall be returned in full. In the event that all parties comply with this provision, but the PUD is not approved within a six (6)-month period following the date of the removal of the Contingency, either party may declare this Agreement to be without further force and effect in a written notice to the other party and Blueduck shall receive a full reimbursement from the City of the Good Faith Deposit and its costs incurred as its sole and exclusive remedy.
- 5. Following the execution of this Purchase Agreement Blueduck will have the right to make such tests on the Property as may be deemed reasonable by Blueduck for purposes of preparing and submitting its PUD plan and application materials to the City; provided that Blueduck will be responsible for repairing any damage caused thereby in the event any party fails to consummate the transaction contemplated by this Agreement. It is agreed that, upon 24 hours' notice to the City, Blueduck, or its agents, contractors or employees shall have free access to the Property during regular City business hours for the purpose of performing said tests.
- 6. Subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, the purchase/sale transaction contemplated under this Agreement shall be consummated at a meeting of the parties (the "Closing")

which shall take place at the offices of the Title Company on a mutually agreed date and time within thirty (30) days after the occurrence of the Conditions Precedent set forth in Paragraph 6, above. At the Closing, City shall execute and deliver to Blueduck (as required) and Blueduck shall execute and deliver to City (as required) the following:

- a. The representative of each party shall deliver to the other evidence of their authority to enter into and to consummate this transaction.
- b. A closing statement prepared by the Title Company showing the pro rations, adjustments, and credits as set forth in this Agreement. City shall pay the cost of the title policy, real estate transfer taxes and deed documentary stamps. Blueduck will pay all other closing costs and the costs of recording the Deed and any other documents requiring recordation. City and Blueduck shall be responsible for their own attorney fees up to and including the Closing, except Blueduck shall be responsible for any attorney fee charges required under the City's development escrow ordinance which may include attorney fees incurred by the City in connection with Blueduck satisfying the Conditions Precedent set forth in this Agreement. All real estate taxes and assessments, if any that become payable prior to the date of Closing shall be paid by the City. All real estate taxes and assessments becoming due and payable on and after the date of Closing shall be the responsibility of Blueduck. All prorations shall be made on a due-date basis.
- c. A Warranty Deed (the "Deed") to the parcel of real estate described in Attachment A. The Warranty Deed executed at the Closing will be delivered subject to any Waived Defects; other matters shown in the title insurance commitment or surveys which are not objected to by Blueduck as provided above; the parking lot and drive agreement between the Farmington Public School District and the Farmington Building Authority dated January 19, 1979; the lien of taxes not yet due and payable as of Closing; and liens arising out of the acts or omissions of Blueduck or any of its agents, contractors or employees (collectively, the "Permitted Encumbrances").
- d. Payment of the Purchase Price less any credits reflected in the Closing Statement.
- e. The signed instruments required under paragraph 8 of this Agreement.
- f. All required valuation and tax reporting documents and affidavits as required by law.
- 7. If the terms and conditions of this Agreement and the Conditions Precedent are satisfied and the City refuses to close, Blueduck shall have as its sole and exclusive remedy the right to a return of the Good Faith Deposit plus reimbursement of its reasonable costs and expenses incurred in satisfying the Conditions Precedent. If the Conditions Precedent are satisfied and Blueduck refuses to close, the Security Deposit shall be forfeited to the City as its sole and exclusive remedy. In no event shall either party be entitled to relief in the form of specific performance under this Agreement, and both parties expressly waive any right they may otherwise have to such relief.

THE PROPERTY IS BEING SOLD IN AN "AS IS" AND "ALL FAULTS" CONDITION including, but 8. not limited to the environmental condition thereof, AS OF THE TIME OF CLOSING. However, City agrees to disclose, in writing, the presence of any Asbestos or other "hazardous substances" on or near the Property that are known to the City. Except as is specifically set forth in this Agreement and the Exhibits attached hereto (a) no statements or representations, express or implied, have been made or are made, and no information or documents supplied by the City are represented to be complete or accurate; and (b) no responsibility has been or is assumed by the City or by any affiliate, person, firm or agent acting or purporting to act on behalf of City as to: (1) the presence of or absence on, in, or beneath or about the Property of any minerals or other substances, including without limitation, any asbestos or any other "hazardous substances", (ii) the condition or repair of the Property, (iii) the value, expense of operation or income potential of the Property; or (iv) any other fact or condition which has or might affect the Property or the condition, repair, value, expense of operation or income potential thereof, including without limitation as to any fact, condition or defect which would be disclosed by a full, complete, and competent survey, investigation of all public and governmental agency's records and of the Property and each and every part or component thereof. For purposes of this Agreement, the term "hazardous substance(s)" shall mean any hazardous or toxic material, substance or waste, which is defined by or for which the production, processing, sale, handling and/or disposal thereof is regulated as a hazardous or toxic material or waste under any applicable statute, law, rule or regulation of any federal, state or local governmental authority. The provisions of this paragraph shall survive the Closing of this transaction.

Blueduck shall deliver to City at Closing an instrument in writing executed by Blueduck wherein Blueduck unconditionally and irrevocably releases any and all claims which it then or may thereafter have against City, any prior or existing partners, joint venturers or members of City, any heirs, personal representatives, successors or assigns of City or any such partners, joint venturers or members, any agents, employees, directors, or officers of City, any such partners, joint venturers or members, or any of the heirs, personal representatives, successor or assigns of City or any such partners, joint venturers or members (the "City Released Parties") arising out of or in conjunction with or relating in any manner whatsoever to (a) the use, treatment, generation, storage, disposal, placement, release or transportation of any Hazardous Materials in, on, under, above, to or from all or any portion of the Property, regardless of whether any such use, treatment, generation, storage, disposal, placement, release or transportation occurred or occurs before, on or after the date of this Agreement or the Closing, (b) the presence of any Hazardous Materials in, on, under or above any portion of the Property, regardless of whether any such Hazardous Materials were or become present before, on or after the date of this Agreement or the Closing, or (c) the migration of any Hazardous Materials from all or any portion of the Property, regardless of whether such migration occurred or occurs before, on or after the date of this Agreement or the Closing (any use, treatment, generation, storage, disposal, placement, release, transportation, presence or migration of any Hazardous Materials described above is referred to herein as an "Environmental Condition"). shall be binding on the successors and assigns of Blueduck and each successor in title to all or any portion of the Property, which is a Blueduck Releasing Party (as defined below). A "Blueduck Releasing Party" shall mean () any person or entity directly or indirectly controlled by, controlling or under common control with Blueduck, (ii) any officer, director, employee, member, shareholder, partner, agent, successor or assign of Blueduck or any of the other persons or entities identified in (i) above, (iii) (A) any person in any degree of consanguinity to any of the persons identified in (i) or (ii), (B) any spouse of any person described in (A) of this sub-subparagraph (iii) or (C) any person in any degree of consanguinity to any person described in (B) of this sub-subparagraph (iii), or (iv) any corporation, partnership, limited liability company, joint venture or any other entity directly or indirectly

controlled by Blueduck and/or all, some or any of the persons or entities described in (i), (ii) or (iii) above. A person of the half blood shall be treated as a person in any degree of consanguinity for purposes of sub-subparagraph (iii) above. Such instrument shall be in form reasonably satisfactory to City and be recorded with the Oakland County Register of Deeds immediately after the Closing. [See addendum (b) attached.]

- 9. City and Blueduck each represent and warrant to the other that with the Exception of the Thomas A Duke Company, Seller's Agent, no broker, finder or like party has been engaged by it in connection with the transaction contemplated by this Agreement. City and Blueduck shall each indemnify the other against any costs, liabilities or expenses, including but not limited to attorneys' fees, arising out of the breach of the foregoing representation and warranty by the indemnifying party.
- 10. Blueduck is responsible for paying all costs and expenses related to the demolition of the existing building on the Property and the design, planning, engineering, permitting and submission of the PUD to be proposed on the Property.
- 11. In the event of any litigation arising out of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover attorneys' fees and costs from the other party.
- 12. This Agreement and the exhibits attached hereto embody the entire Agreement between the parties in connection with the sale of the Property to Blueduck and there are no oral or parole agreements existing between the parties relating to this transaction which are not expressly set forth and covered hereby. This Agreement may not be modified except in writing signed by both parties.
- 13. Failure of either party to complain of any act or omission on the part of the other party and known to the complaining party shall be deemed to be a waiver by such party of any of its rights hereunder. No waiver by any party at any time, expressed or implied, of any breach of any provision of this Agreement shall be deemed to be a waiver or a breach of any other provision of this Agreement or a consent to any subsequent breach of the same or any other provision. If any action by any party shall require the consent or approval of another party, such consent or approval of such action on any one occasion shall not be deemed a consent to or approval of such action on any subsequent occasion or a consent to or approval of any action on the same or any subsequent occasion.
- 14. No third party, other than the City and Blueduck, their heirs, personal representatives, successors and permitted assigns, shall have any rights to enforce or rely upon this Agreement, which is binding upon and made solely for the benefit of the City and Blueduck, their heirs, personal representatives, successors and permitted assigns, and not for the benefit of any other third party.
- 15. All notices required to be given hereunder shall be in writing. Notice shall be deemed as given hereunder: (a) upon personal delivery to the addresses set forth below; or, (b) upon receipt (or affirmative refusal to accept) if properly addressed and sent certified mail, return receipt requested; or (c) upon depositing such notice in the custody of a nationally-recognized overnight delivery service and sent by overnight delivery. Notice shall be deemed properly addressed if sent to the following addresses:

#### **Requested Action:**

Move to approve resolution regarding annual permit application with MDOT for Miscellaneous Operations within State Trunkline Right of Way, and to adopt MDOT Performance and Indemnification Resolution.

#### **Background:**

The City of Farmington has a full maintenance contract for Grand River Avenue from the east intersection of M-5 to Gill Road, and is responsible for the winter maintenance only from Gill Road west to Halstead Road. The Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) reimburses the City for its actual labor and material expenses for all work done under the contract. The City further secures annual permits from the State to do maintenance work on the road and City utilities as well as install banners within the trunkline right-of-way.

The Department of Transportation requires that the City, by resolution, indemnify the State from any liability, which may occur as the result of work that the City is performing or banners that have been hung within the State right-of-way. The City resolution further authorizes the City Manager and the Director of Public Services to make application to the Michigan Department of Transportation for necessary permit work within State of Michigan right-of-way on behalf of the City. The remaining provisions within the resolution are relatively standard.

The attached resolution needs to specify individuals within the City that are authorized to apply for the right-of-way permits. This would include the Public Safety Director Frank Demers, Public Works Superintendent Chuck Eudy, Public Safety Assistant Director Ted Warthman, Assistant Superintendent Josh Leach, and Matt Parks with Orchard Hiltz and McCliment.

#### Financial Impact

The City has historically received between \$50,000 and \$80,000 per year to maintain Grand River within the City limits. The amount will vary depending on weather conditions and other maintenance issues.

# PERFORMANCE RESOLUTION FOR GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES

This Performance Resolution is required by the Michigan Department of Transportation for purposes of issuing to a municipality an "Individual Permit for Use of State Highway Right of Way" or an "Annual Application and Permit for Miscellaneous Operations Within State Highway Right of Way".

RESOLVED WHEREAS, the _		
	(city, village, township, etc.)	

hereinafter referred to as the "GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY," periodically applies to the Michigan Department of Transportation, hereinafter referred to as the "DEPARTMENT," for permits, referred to as "PERMIT," to construct, operate, use and/or maintain utility or other facilities, or to conduct other activities, on, over, and under State Highway right of way at various locations within and adjacent to its corporate limits;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the DEPARTMENT granting such PERMIT, the GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY agrees that:

- 1. Each party to this Agreement shall remain responsible for any claims arising out of their own acts and/or omissions during the performance of this Agreement, as provided by law. This Agreement is not intended to increase either party's liability for, or immunity from, tort claims, nor shall it be interpreted, as giving either party hereto a right of indemnification, either by Agreement or at law, for claims arising out of the performance of this Agreement.
- 2. Any work performed for the GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY by a contractor or subcontractor will be solely as a contractor for the GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY and not as a contractor or agent of the DEPARTMENT. The DEPARTMENT shall not be subject to any obligations or liabilities by vendors and contractors of the GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY, or their subcontractors or any other person not a party to the PERMIT without its specific prior written consent and notwithstanding the issuance of the PERMIT. Any claims by any contractor or subcontractor will be the sole responsibility of the GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY.
- 3. The GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY shall take no unlawful action or conduct, which arises either directly or indirectly out of its obligations, responsibilities, and duties under the PERMIT which results in claims being asserted against or judgment being imposed against the State of Michigan, the Michigan Transportation Commission, the DEPARTMENT, and all officers, agents and employees thereof and those contracting governmental bodies performing permit activities for the DEPARTMENT and all officers, agents, and employees thereof, pursuant to a maintenance contract. In the event that the same occurs, for the purposes of the PERMIT, it will be considered as a breach of the PERMIT thereby giving the State of Michigan, the DEPARTMENT, and/or the Michigan Transportation Commission a right to seek and obtain any necessary relief or remedy, including, but not by way of limitation, a judgment for money damages.
- 4. The GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY It will, by its own volition and/or request by the DEPARTMENT, promptly restore and/or correct physical or operating damages to any State Highway Right of Way resulting from the installation construction, operation and/or maintenance of the GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY'S facilities according to a PERMIT issued by the DEPARTMENT.
- 5. With respect to any activities authorized by PERMIT, when the GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY requires insurance on its own or its contractor's behalf it shall also require that such policy include as named insured the State of Michigan, the Transportation Commission, the DEPARTMENT, and all officers, agents, and employees thereof and those governmental bodies performing permit activities for the DEPARTMENT and all officers, agents, and employees thereof, pursuant to a maintenance contract.

This resolution shall continue inforce from this date until cancelled by the GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY or the DEPARTMENT with no less than thirty (30) days prior written notice to the other party. It will not be cancelled or otherwise terminated by the GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY with regard to any PERMIT which has already been issued or activity which has already been undertaken.
