Background:

This budget amendment was approved by the DDA Board on August 6, 2025 for submittal to the City Council.

The amendment includes an increase in Expenditures, Capital Outlay, Art Promenade 248-000.00-970.242 from \$321,000 to \$427,254 to include construction, construction contingency, and construction engineering.

Construction: \$366,221

Construction Contingency: \$30,533

Construction Engineering Contract: \$30,500

Note that a \$163,000 Main Street Oakland County (MSOC) Placemaking Grant, funded by ARPA, has been allocated to support the project. These ARPA funds must be used before September 2026.

Agenda Topic: Spray Patch Road Repair on Tree Hill Boulevard and Farmington Road

Proposed Motion: Move to approve Spray-Patch Road Repair Inc. of Madison Heights, MI to conduct the spray-patch road repair on Tree Hill Boulevard and other streets not to exceed \$15,000.

Background: The concrete road is deteriorating due to ASR (alkali-silica reaction). When ASR is present, hairline fractures cause the joints to deteriorate. In 2018, the condition of Tree Hill Boulevard in Chatham Hill Subdivision was so poor it required Public Works to conduct weekly cold patching. The most significant deterioration was between Lansbury and Saxony Streets.

In 2019, funds were allocated to conduct limited spray-patching on Tree Hill Boulevard. The spray-patching has held up for 5 years with little additional maintenance from Public Works. The road has continued to deteriorate from the ASR and Public Works needed to begin cold patching the street again in 2024.

The fall of 2024, due to the limited funding allocated for the replacement of the spray-patch, Spray-Patch Road Repair recommended focusing on repairs in the most deteriorated areas beginning on the west side of Tree Hill Boulevard from Freedom Road to near Lansbury Street. From that point, the entire width of Tree Hill Boulevard towards Saxony Street should be scarfed to remove the loose ASR affected concrete, old cold patch, and spray-patching material. The surface would be prepared to place new spray-patch material. The remaining portion of Treehill Boulevard was delayed until this Fiscal Year.

During the budgeting cycle, \$15,000 of funding was allocated to continue the spray-patch program to the remaining portion of Treehill Boulevard. Following the completion of Treehill Boulevard, if the funding is not exhausted, other streets could be considered to receive spray-patch repair. Other Streets we are considering are, Farmington Road from Shiawassee to 10 Mile.

Background:

City administration prepared a RFP (request for proposals) for the repurposing of the Shiawassee Park tennis courts to include two (2) Pickleball courts and one (1) Tennis Court. The current Tennis Courts are underused and with the recent interest in Pickleball, a decision was made to convert one Tennis Court into two Pickleball Courts.

The RFP was posted to Bidnet Direct on 3/4/2025. Improvements included installation of new tennis and pickleball nets, installation of fences to separate pickleball courts and tennis courts. New East and West side access locations to the courts. Crack sealing and sealcoating of existing asphalt and painted court with new lines.

Public Works Administration recommends approving payment for the Shiawassee Park Tennis/Pickleball court Improvement Project to Laser Striping and Sport Surface in the amount of \$87,700.

Laser Sport Surfacing anticipates the surface to last 4 – 5 years.

Proposed Motion:

Move to award Fiscal Year 2025/26 Annual Crack Sealing/Overband contract to K&B Asphalt Sealcoating Inc. of Adrian, MI per the RFP and allow City Administration to execute the contract in the amount of \$45,000, subject to any minor amendments to the final from the City Manager's office and the City Attorney's office.

Background:

City Administration and Orchard Hiltz & McCliment (OHM) have developed a 4-year rotating pavement crack sealing/overband schedule for major and local street within the community. This will be the fifth year the City of Farmington has participated with several other similar-sized communities to solicit the RFP for those services. The City of Wixom established and coordinated the RFP and has recommended awarding the RFP to K&B Asphalt Sealcoating Inc. located at 120 N. Main Street Unit A, Adrian MI 49221.

\$50,000 is allocated in the Fiscal Year 2025/26 budget to conduct the crack sealing/overbanding. \$45,000 is reserved for the crack sealing portion of this RFP, \$5,000 is reserved for OHM to conduct inspections and supply payment applications of the crack sealing project. Unit pricing for the crack sealing this year is \$1.16 per pound. K&B Asphalt Sealcoating could complete the project this fall.





EXTENSION OF MASONIC HALL PARKING LOT LICENSE AGREEMENT

This Extension of Parking Lot License Agreement is entered into this _____ day of September, 2025, between Farmington Masonic Temple Association ("Licensor") and the City of Farmington ("Licensee").

RECITATIONS

- A. On September 14, 2011, Licensee and Licensor previously entered into a Masonic Hall Parking Lot License Agreement ("Agreement") to allow Licensee to utilize the Masonic Hall parking lot, located at 23715 Farmington Road, Farmington, MI 48336, for public parking pursuant to certain terms and conditions.
 - B. The Agreement was for a 10-year period, ending on September 14, 2021.
- C. Licensor and Licensee extended the Agreement for an additional year until September 14, 2022. Thereafter the parties continued the arrangement, but without a formal extension.
- D. Licensor and Licensee desire to again extend the Agreement while they evaluate whether continuing the Agreement for a longer period of time is advisable, and whether any changes to the terms or conditions to the Agreement are either necessary or appropriate.
- **NOW, THEREFORE**, Licensor and Licensee agree to extend the Parking Lot License Agreement until September 14, 2029. The terms and conditions of the Agreement shall continue except with regard to the termination date. Prior to September 14, 2029, the Licensee shall continue to maintain the parking lot and the three (3) hour time limitation in the PUD Agreement governing the use of the property shall be held in abeyance.

In addition to the foregoing:

With respect to barrier free/handicap parking spaces, Licensee shall take such actions as are necessary to provide for 3 permanent such spaces in close proximity to the ramp and 2 temporary spaces located near the door on the Farmington Road frontage, both such areas as depicted in Exhibit A hereto. The 2 temporary spaces shall only be designated or signed for barrier free/handicap use during Licensor's business or social meetings. Licensee shall determine the most appropriate method for the designation of/signage for the 2 temporary spaces, which may include removable poles or signs to be placed and removed by Licensor.

The Lot shall be posted so as to prohibit parking between 2:00 am and 6:00 am every day of the week.

Introduction of Amendment to the Farmington Code of Ordinances, Sections 2-457 and 2-458 for the purposes of increasing the authority of the City Manager as Purchase Agent to purchase goods, assets, or services up to the amount of \$25,000. **FIRST READING**

Requested Action:

Motion to approve Introduction of Ordinance C-____-2025 to amend the City Manager's purchasing authority up to \$25,000.

Background:

City Council has talked on a number of occasions, including at budget time, about increasing the City Manager's purchasing authority, as Purchasing Agent under the City's Charter, from the current "up to" \$10,000 amount to up to \$25,000. Attached is a proposed Ordinance Amendment that would accomplish that change. The impetus behind this proposed change is simply to keep up with cost of goods and services. The change would result in the City Manager being authorized to make the purchase of goods and services up to \$25,000 without having to come to City Council for approval. This would limit the Council's need to act on what are some fairly small/minor routine expenditures.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

Section 1 of Ordinance. Ordinance Amendment.

Chapter 2, "Administration," Article VI, "Finance," Division 2, "Purchasing," of the City of Farmington Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2-456. - Purchasing agent.

[Unchanged]

Sec. 2-457. Purchases of less than ten-twenty-five thousand dollars.

Purchases of goods, assets, or services, the cost of which is less than ten-twenty-five thousand dollars (\$1025,000.00), shall follow the rules established by the purchasing agent. All purchases, except for the employment of professional services and purchases specifically excluded in the purchasing rules require competitive pricing unless the requirement is specifically waived by the city manager upon a determination that no advantage to the city would result therefrom.

Sec. 2-458. Purchases of ten-twenty-five thousand dollars or more.

Where any purchase involves an expenditure of ten twenty-five thousand dollars (\$1025,000.00) or more and competitive bidding is required under the provisions of sections 12.1 and 12.2 of the City Charter, the bidding procedure shall be as follows:

- (1) The purchasing agent shall solicit bids from a reasonable number of such qualified prospective bidders as are known to him by sending each a copy of the notice requesting bids and notice thereof shall be posted in the city hall. Bids shall also be solicited by newspaper advertisement when directed by the council or when in the judgment of the purchasing agent it would be advantageous to the city.
- (2) Unless prescribed by the council or the city manager, the purchasing agent shall prescribe the amount of any security to be deposited with any bid which deposit shall be in the form of cash, certified or cashier's check, or bid bond written by a surety company

- authorized to do business in the state. The amount of such security shall be expressed in terms of percentage of the bid submitted.
- (3) Bids shall be opened in public, at the time and place designated in the notice requesting bids, in the presence of the purchasing agent and the city clerk. The bids shall thereupon be carefully examined and tabulated and reported to the city manager by the purchasing agent with a recommendation. The city manager at a subsequent council meeting shall report to the council with a recommendation. After tabulation, all bids may be inspected by the competing bidders. In lieu of the procedure for opening bids specified in this division, the council may direct that bids be opened at a council meeting.
- (4) When such bids are submitted to the council, if the council shall find any of the bids to be satisfactory, it may accept the same. Such acceptance may be by resolution or ordinance. The council shall have the right to reject any or all bids, to waive irregularities in bidding and accept bids that do not conform in every respect to the bidding requirements, and to accept any bid that it determines to be in the city's best interests.
- (5) All bids and deposits of certified or cashier's checks may be retained until the contract is awarded and signed. If any successful bidder fails or refuses to enter into the contract awarded to him within five (5) days after the same has been awarded, or to file any bond required within the same time, the deposit accompanying his bid shall be forfeited to the city, and the council may, in its sole discretion, extend the five-day period, award the contract to any qualified bidder or the contract may be re-advertised.
- (6) Such expenditure shall be made the subject of a written contract in compliance with Code section 2-461 et seq. A purchase order shall be a sufficient written contract in cases where the expenditure is a usual and ordinary purchase of goods, assets, or services and is not an expenditure for the construction of an asset.

Should any section, subdivision, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the validity of the Ordinance as a whole, or in part, shall not be affected other than the part invalidated.

Section 4 of Ordinance. Savings.

All proceedings pending and all rights and liabilities existing, acquired or incurred at the time this Ordinance takes effect, are saved and may be consummated according to the law in force when they were commenced.

Section 5 of Ordinance. Effective Date.

This ordinance shall be effective upon publication in the manner prescribed by law.
