I would first like to take this opportunity to say "Thank You" for the support you've shown during 2011 for the public safety department. 2011 continued to be a challenging year as the department had to balance the difficult economic times with providing quality service to the citizens of Farmington. Through it all, the staff of the public safety department continued to provide first rate service that the citizens of Farmington know and expect.

We are pleased to announce for the fifth straight year that "Part A" (most serious) crimes decreased in 2011 by 4.2%. As part of that, residential break-ins were down 42.1%, (11 vs. 19 in 2010), motor vehicle theft was down 66.7% and larcenies were down 23.5%. Unfortunately, there was an increase in the number of commercial break-ins reported in 2011 by six (16 vs. 10 in 2010) and two armed robberies compared to none in 2010.

There was one (1) commercial fire and five (5) residential fires in 2011. Sadly, the city experienced its first fire related fatality in over twenty (20) years when a resident at Jamestown Apartments succumb to smoke and burn injuries. Because of the fast response and quick actions of the public safety department, estimated property loss for 2011 was less that \$150,000.00. The fast response of the public safety department also resulted in two (2) lives being saved in 2011. One of the victims was suffering from sudden cardiac arrest and the second was choking and had stopped breathing.

The public safety department was proud to place in service a new 2011 HME fire truck that was purchased with grant funds from the Department of Homeland Security Assistance to Firefighter Grant in the amount of \$275,000.00. This grant allowed the department to replace a thirty-five (35) year old fire truck. The department continued to receive funding from the U.S. Department of Justice to fund the salary and benefits of an officer until October of 2012. The department also received a BYRNE grant for just over \$25,000.00 to purchase surveillance cameras that will be placed at the Riley Pavilion and Shiawassee Playscape in 2012.

It should be noted that crime data figures contained in this report may contain slight number variations. This is due to the ongoing reclassifications of incidents determined to be civil, items reported stolen that were misplaced, lost property determined to be stolen, etc.

On behalf of the proud members of the Farmington Public Safety Department, we again thank the city officials for your support. I am pleased to present the 2011 Annual Report.

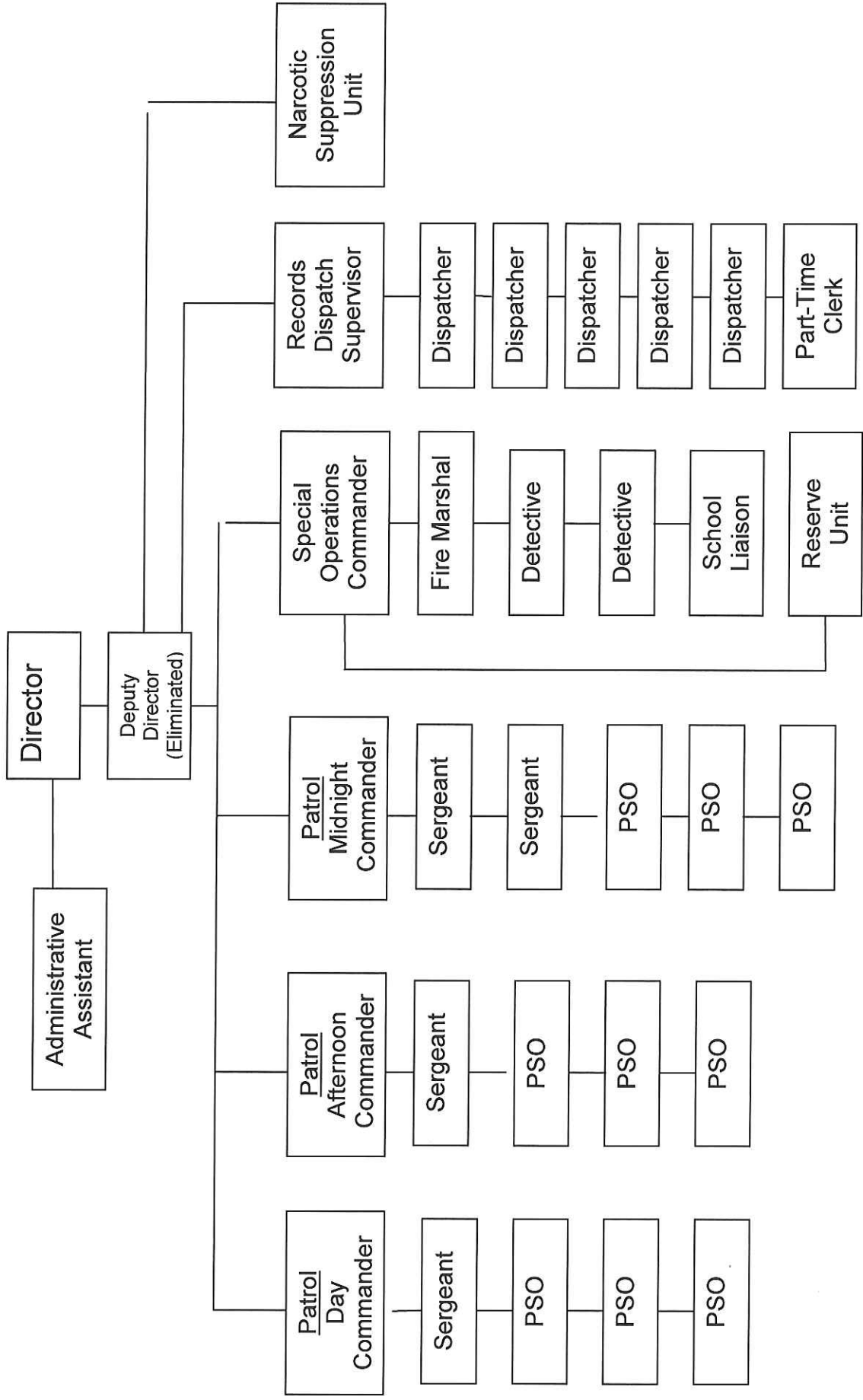

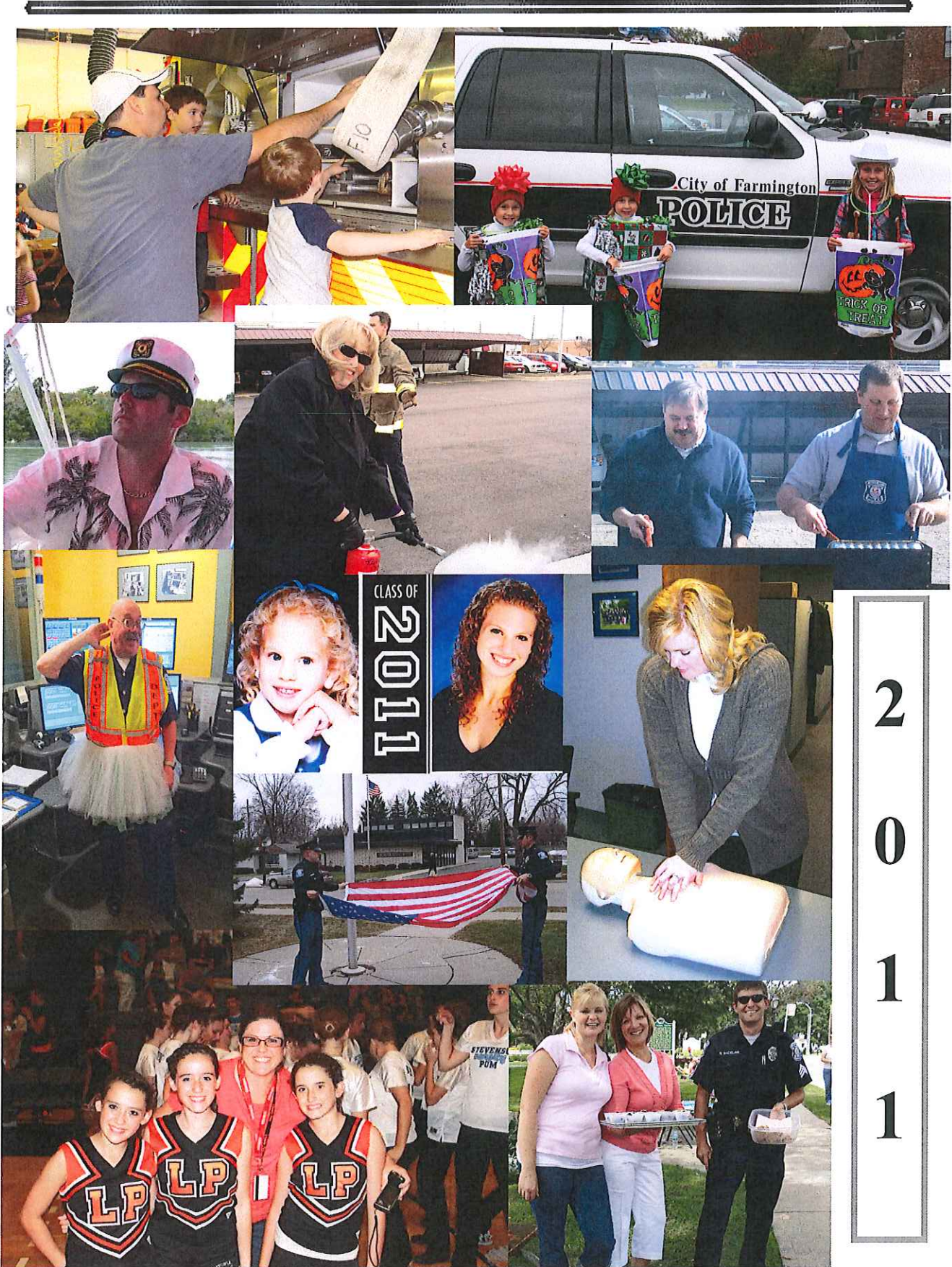

## DEPARTMENT ACCOMPLISHMENTS (2011)

- ❖ There were no crime related deaths.
- ❖ No public safety personnel were seriously injured or killed in police or fire activities.
- ❖ Serious "Group A" crime decreased 4.2% in 2011. This decrease follows a 1.7% drop in 2010 "Group A" crime.
- ❖ Fifty-five (55) fewer "Group A" crimes occurred in 2011, compared to 2007. This is just over a ten percent (-10.8%) reduction in five (5) years.
- ❖ Total number of burglaries decreased by 2 in 2011 (27) as compared to 2010 (29).
- ❖ The public safety department recorded two hundred sixty-nine (269) property damage accidents in 2011, seventeen (17) fewer than in 2010.
- ❖ The public safety department was awarded a BYRNE grant from the Department of Justice to purchase surveillance cameras for Riley Pavilion and Shiawassee Park Playscape.
- ❖ The public safety department continued Apartment Watch meetings. In addition, thousands of apartment patrols were conducted and numerous crimes were interrupted.





# **COMMUNITY POLICING**

---

## COMMUNITY POLICING

The Farmington Public Safety Department embraces community partnerships that promote effective police and fire services. Sixty-eight (68) special services and programs focus on youth, neighborhoods, roadways and the businesses in our community. New or revised programs in 2011 are noted in bold print.

### ALCOHOL TESTING

In cooperation with the probation department at the 47<sup>th</sup> District Court, the public safety department is testing probationers for the use of alcohol each morning.

### ANIMAL TRAPPING PROGRAM

The department loans animal traps to residents (returnable deposit fee).

### APARTMENT WATCH PROGRAM

The public safety department received a COPS Hiring Recovery Program (CHRP) grant to replace a vacant public safety officer position. The department has increased police patrols, bike patrols and foot patrols in the city's thirty-four multi-housing communities. Monthly crime prevention presentations are part of the program.

### AUTO IMPOUND

Public safety officers electronically complete impound paperwork when impounding vehicles, which automatically sends the necessary information to the tow companies.

### BICYCLE SAFETY EVENTS

The Farmington Public Safety Department, along with LOC Federal Credit Union and AAA, sponsors bicycle safety events. The department also sells bicycle licenses to help identify lost or stolen bicycles.

### BLOCK PARTIES

Department personnel visit neighborhood block parties with police cars and fire trucks, and distribute crime and fire prevention materials.

### BUSINESS WATCH

Special meetings, programs and crime alerts are coordinated with the members of our business community.

### CHILD CAR SEAT SAFETY INSPECTION

Citizens can have their child's car seat inspected for safety, proper installation and compliance with State law by the department's fire marshal who is a graduate of the National Child Safety Certification program. The department also has a limited number of free car seats to distribute.

### CITIZEN AWARD RECOGNITION PROGRAM

The department recognizes members of the community who assist the public safety department.

CIVIC ORGANIZATIONS

Members of the department participate in thirty-eight (38) community and professional organizations.

CLICK IT OR TICKET

In addition to regular seat belt enforcement, the department participates in annual Memorial Day selective enforcement initiatives. Such initiatives save lives, reduce injuries, and help keep Michigan ninety-four percent (94%) compliant.

COMMUNITY COALITION WORKSHOPS

Members of the department participate in substance abuse and relationship violence workshops and programs.

COMMISSION ON CHILDREN, YOUTH & FAMILY

The department participates in the community commission and their events that promote the children, youth and families of our community.

COMPLIANCE CHECKS

The department conducts several annual alcohol and tobacco operations to discourage sales to minors.

CRIME ALERTS

The department expanded the capabilities of the department's crime alert notification system by utilizing Nixle software. Residents can now choose to receive text messages or Twitter communications. The public safety department can now send photographs and area messages with the alerts.

CRIME PREVENTION NOTICE PROGRAM

Public safety officers issue crime prevention notices and warnings to residents. Examples include warnings issued to residents who leave valuables unattended, doors unlocked or garage doors open.

CRIME WATCH WEBSITE

Farmingtonpublicsafety.com is the web address. The site features crime statistics, Neighborhood Watch information, annual reports and other items of interest.

CROP WALK

The department coordinates participation and the safety of three hundred annual walkers who raise money for the needy.

CROSSING GUARD PROGRAM

The department hires, manages and conducts annual training for school crossing guards at designated schools.

DECOY CARS

The department strategically places unoccupied patrol vehicles on streets to deter speeding and in business areas to discourage crime.

---

**DTE STREET LIGHT DETAIL**

In cooperation with Detroit Edison (DTE), public safety officers check all the street lights in the city each month and report any outages to DTE for repair.

**E-CRASH**

Public safety officers electronically complete accident reports. Motorists and insurance companies can still obtain copies of the reports electronically.

**FARMINGTON YOUTH ASSISTANCE**

Department members attend board meetings and make appropriate referrals as an alternative to criminal prosecution.

**FIRE INSPECTION PROGRAM**

The department is proactive in conducting fire inspections to reduce loss of life and property.

**FIRE SAFETY/PUBLIC EDUCATION PROGRAMS**

The department conducts various fire safety education programs to pre-schools and other community groups.

**FIRST AID, EMERGENCY PROGRAM**

The department participates in several educational programs such as the Emergency Preparedness Commission.

**FOOT BEAT PATROLS**

Public safety officers are assigned to foot patrols in the downtown center and at special events.

**FRAUD-NET**

Detectives fight fraud and bank crimes with an on-line database linking bankers and law enforcement officers. The partnership promotes crime prevention and helps solve crimes.

**GUN LOCK GIVEAWAY PROGRAM**

The department gives away free locks to residents to promote gun safety.

**HALLOWEEN FESTIVAL, CANDY PATROL**

The department participates in the safety coordination at special Halloween events. Special patrols target neighborhoods and officers give away Halloween treats.

**HAZARDOUS MATERIALS TEAM**

Fire Marshal Madeline represents Farmington on the North Oakland County Hazardous Materials Response Team.

**HOLIDAY ALCOHOL ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM**

This award winning program utilizes public education, compliance operations, special

---

patrols and partnering with several community organizations and the business community.

#### HOUSE CHECK PROGRAM

Residents may notify the department when their homes may be vacant for a period of time. The information is kept in dispatch and is helpful when the need arises to contact the homeowner should a crime or emergency occur.

#### INTERNSHIP TRAINING

College students or individuals interested in public safety who reside or work in Farmington may apply for internship training and education.

#### JAIL DIVERSION PROGRAM

Public safety personnel are trained to divert mentally ill prisoners into treatment facilities as an alternative to jail.

#### KNOX BOX PROGRAM

The department coordinates the installation of security boxes for elderly or handicap residents. The boxes contain keys to allow public safety personnel easy emergency access.

#### LOST AND FOUND ANIMALS

The department logs lost animal information to help locate owners when animals are found.

#### MICHIGAN COMMUNITY CHILD WATCH

This program operates in conjunction with Farmington Public Schools. Community members are screened and homes are identified where children may seek safe haven.

#### MiHAN

The department partnered with the Michigan Health Alert Network to electronically receive critical emergency public health information. Public safety officers utilize the information to properly respond to public health emergencies.

#### MISSING CHILDREN PROGRAMS

The department participates in child identification efforts. Policies and procedures are in place for quick activation of "Amber Alert" and "A Child Is Missing" programs. One thousand residents a minute can be notified by telephone to watch for a child.

#### MOUNTAIN BIKE PROGRAM

The department has three mountain bikes used by officers at special events and during specific tactical operations.

#### MULTICULTURAL, MULTIRACIAL COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The department is represented on the steering committee and participates in the philosophies and programs of this important group.



---

#### NARCOTICS SUPPRESSION UNIT (NSU)

Specially selected officers investigate illegal drug tips, execute search warrants and arrest drug offenders.

#### NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

The department conducts monthly meetings with residents to teach crime prevention and provide crime updates. Special crime alert bulletins are delivered by community policing officers to neighborhoods experiencing crime.

#### OPERATION SAFE RIDE

The department partners this project with Mothers Against Drunk Driving to coordinate safe rides home for individuals consuming excess alcohol on New Year's Eve.

#### PARADE COORDINATION

The department participates and ensures community safety at the Little League Parade, Homecoming Parade, Memorial Day Parade and Founder's Festival Parade.

#### PARENT FORUMS

The department partners with Farmington Public Schools to present annual crime prevention programs at parent educational forums.

#### POLICE BENEVOLENT ASSOCIATION

The Farmington Public Safety Department, Farmington Hills police and fire departments and the Franklin Police Department hosts an annual golf outing, dinner and raffle, as well as live and silent auctions. The event raises funds to assist public safety personnel, their families and members of the general public during times of death, illness or personal crisis.

#### PRIVATE PROPERTY ACCIDENT PROGRAM

The department responds to private property vehicle crashes, preserves the peace and records the facts on a police report.

#### PUBLIC SAFETY TOURS AND PRESENTATIONS

The department provides tours of the public safety building, vehicles, and responds to public safety requests for speakers and presentations.

#### RECRUITMENT PROGRAM

The department actively recruits officer candidates at universities, colleges and academies. Applications are released throughout the year.

#### RESERVE OFFICER PROGRAM

The department recruits, screens and trains members of the community who supplement police, fire and civil defense protection.

#### SCHOOL LIAISON OFFICER PROGRAM

This successful program has serviced all Farmington public schools since 1990. Officer

---

Christine Schutz is assigned to Farmington High School. She provides on site support to school administration, provides classroom instruction, serves as a connection with students, provides special presentations to parent groups, serves on various school committees, conducts crime prevention and enforcement, and investigates criminal matters occurring at the school.

#### SCHOOL SAFETY PROGRAM

The department is prepared to respond to all types of school and community emergencies. The Farmington School District Director of Safe Schools and department personnel meet regularly and discuss concerns and safety issues. The public safety department maintains a special vehicle equipped with emergency equipment should a serious incident require a rapid response.

#### SELECTIVE ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM

Patrol officers conduct weekly selective traffic enforcement details at various locations throughout the city, several at the request of residents and Traffic and Safety Board members.

#### SERVICE COMPLIANCE PROGRAM

The department promotes professional traffic stops and maintains a formal complaint procedure. The department also utilizes in-car cameras to verify professional conduct and re-create a factual record of public contacts.

#### SMOKE ALARM GIVEAWAY PROGRAM

The department provides free, battery operated smoke detectors to residents of the community.

#### SOBRIETY COURT HOME VISIT PROGRAM

Commander DuLong, Sergeant Friess, PSO Schutz, PSO Morche and PSO Wash visit the homes of residents arrested for drunken driving to encourage sobriety.

#### SPECIAL EVENT COORDINATION

The department plans and coordinates public safety personnel for special community events. Special operational orders are written defining department procedures.

#### SPECIAL PATROL PROGRAMS

The department identifies areas for special tactical patrols of uniformed or plain clothes officers. The department also honors requests for special attention patrols from residents and business owners.

#### SPEED TRAILER PROGRAM

The department identifies areas requiring "speed awareness" and "deterrence." A strategically placed trailer informs passing motorists of their speed. The department honors reasonable suggestions for trailer placement from residents and business owners.

---

### START

The department participates in the Safe Therapeutic Assault Response Team. Investigators are partnered with specially trained forensic nurses to collect sexual assault evidence and counsel sexual assault victims.

### TEDDY BEAR GIVEAWAY PROGRAM

The department stocks donated teddy bears to give to children who are involved in traumatic events.

### TRAFFIC AND SAFETY BOARD

The department acts as a liaison with the city's traffic board and traffic engineer. Public safety officers encourage citizens with unsolved traffic concerns to contact the Traffic and Safety Board.

### TURN AROUND PROGRAM

Students at Farmington schools who turn their lives around in a positive manner are honored at an annual banquet. The department is a major sponsor and members serve on the planning and nominations committees.

### VEHICLE LOCK OUT PROGRAM

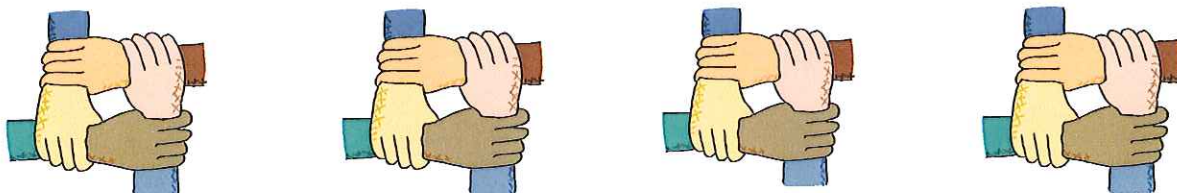
Public safety officers respond to assist citizens locked out of their vehicles.

### WASTE WATCH

The department partnered with community Waste Management workers who are trained to act as extra eyes and ears to report crime.

### WEATHER EDUCATION PROGRAM

The fire marshal coordinates weather and tornado alert publications for free distribution to the public. The department also promotes public education and notification during tornados and severe weather alert month.





# **TECHNOLOGY ENHANCEMENTS**

## TECHNOLOGY ENHANCEMENTS

The Farmington Public Safety Department added one (1) new technology in 2011, six (6) technologies in 2010, six (6) in 2009, five (5) in 2008, nine (9) in 2007, seven (7) in 2006 and fifteen (15) in 2005. Forty-nine (49) new technologies have been introduced in the past seven (7) years to enhance public services.

The Department of Public Safety has added the following technologies in **2011**:

- **Consolidated Law Enforcement Advanced Records:** The public safety department switched report writing software that was designed by Oakland County specifically for Oakland County police agencies. This also allowed Oakland County to save over \$250,000.00 each year in maintenance fees.

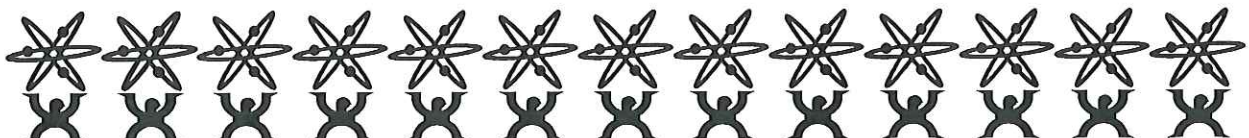

Public safety administration is commanded by Director Robert Schulz and assisted by Administrative Assistant Carole Lukas.

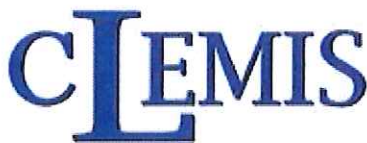
The department administration is responsible for the following tasks: budgeting, personnel administration, policies and procedures, rules and regulations, payroll, personnel records, grants, special events, representation at police, fire and community organizations, purchasing, Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards (MCOLES) rosters and Law Enforcement Distribution funds, training, planning, personnel scheduling, discipline, media coordination and supervision of department personnel.

The director and command staff are responsible for participation and attendance at the following community organizations, committees and professional associations:

## PATROL DIVISION

The uniform patrol division was led by Commanders Terrance Purves, Theodore Warthman and Justin DuLong in 2011. Four sergeants; Jeffrey Brow, Richard Friess, Todd Anderson and Bob Houhanisin assist the commanders. Nine public safety officers are assigned to the patrol division: Richard Hennessy, Scott Herrmann, Aaron Malewski, Alan Baranski, Mark Keeley, Patrick Spelman, Andrew Morche, William Wood and James Wren.

The patrol division is responsible for providing the primary response to police, medical and fire emergencies. Each member of the patrol division attends regular training to increase their knowledge and practical skills in each discipline. Fire and medical trainings are held each month at the Farmington Public Safety training center. Patrol division officers attend police trainings at various locations in the area. Examples of some police training attended by the patrol division in 2011 include: Commercial Vehicle and Motor Carrier courses, Officer Safety Programs, Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault training, Firearms Laws and Media Relations.

The patrol division prides itself in its fast response to police, fire and medical emergencies. Aggressive subdivision patrols and the fast response times allow officers to make arrests and prevent crime proactively. The "Apartment Watch" program encourages officers to aggressively patrol apartment complexes resulting in arrests and crimes being prevented. Patrol officers received commercial vehicle training which allows officers to enforce motor carrier laws. This enforcement makes for much safer roadways through out the city.

The patrol division provides numerous community policing services. For example, our officers patrol neighborhoods and issue crime prevention notices (blue cards) indicating potential criminal opportunities, hazards or concerns observed at a residence. Station tours, visiting block parties, picking up stray pets, assisting residents who have fallen, home/vehicle lockouts, selective enforcement on neighborhood streets and any other requests for assistance from citizens are just some of the services that the patrol division provides and residents enjoy. The officers of the patrol division take great pride in providing this extra personalized service to our residents.

## **SPECIAL OPERATIONS**

The Officer-in-Charge of the Special Operations Bureau is Commander Frank Demers. The commander supervises Detective Shane Wash, Detective Scott Brown, and School Liaison Officer Christine Schutz. The Fire Marshal, Sergeant Reginald Madeline, is also assigned to the Special Operations Bureau.

Special Operations personnel are responsible for some of the following functions; criminal investigations, evidence technician services, photography, fire inspections, fire equipment maintenance, reserve public safety officer and reserve fire fighter background investigations, Neighborhood Watch, evidence and property room management, school liaison program, solicitor permits, alcohol, tobacco and massage compliance operations.

In 2011, Special Operations personnel received specialized training on the topics of Chemical, Biological, Radioactive, Nuclear and Explosive (CBRNE) awareness, environmental crimes awareness, Incident Command for Fire Service, firefighting strategies & tactics, Fire Company Officer I & II, Identi-Kit Advance Facial Composite Software, Crime Scene Evidence Technician, Forgery detection, Computer Crimes investigations, Death Investigations and Bomb Threat Assessment for Schools.

The following is a summary of the number of cases and other duties handled by the division in 2011:

- 210 Criminal investigations
- 87 Warrants obtained
- 12 Juvenile petitions filed
- 15 Massage facility inspections
- 1 Liquor license facility investigations
- 2 Personnel background investigations

The Farmington Public Safety Department's NSU (Narcotic Suppression Unit) had a successful year for 2011.

The Farmington Public Safety Department's NSU (Narcotic Suppression Unit) has continued to strive to suppress the illegal drug use/supply in the City of Farmington and surrounding communities.

The successes of Farmington NSU have been the result of the collaborative efforts of concerned community members coming forward with drug related tips and information, along with the drug related arrests made by dedicated department personnel.

In 2011, Farmington NSU Officers investigated sixteen (16) narcotic tips, which led to several drug related targets and a nexus to illegal drug use/sale in the City of

Farmington and surrounding community. The subsequent execution of search warrants led to the arrests of five (5) persons for narcotic related violations and charges being filed, along with forfeiture proceedings being initiated.

Farmington NSU strives to work with the community, along with regional drug task forces, to suppress narcotic activity and other crimes in the City of Farmington.

## FIRE SERVICE

Fire Marshal Reginald Madeline oversees the department's fire and medical operations. As part of his regular duties, the fire marshal conducts fire inspections, schedules and performs maintenance on the department's fire apparatus and coordinates monthly fire fighting and medical training. All sworn personnel are certified firefighters and medical first responders. Four members of the department have advanced medical training and are licensed emergency medical technicians. Additional services provided by the department's fire service include; fire extinguishment, hazardous materials response, smoke detector give away program, public education seminars on fire safety, first aid, infant/child safety seat inspections and the commercial/residential Knox Box program. Due to quick response times and quality training, the fire loss in the past year is estimated at \$127,500 in 2011.

## RECORDS AND DISPATCH

Records/Communications Supervisor Corinne Brazzil supervises five dispatchers; John Foxton, Danielle Shorrock, Jennifer Jordan, Jo-Ann Alcantara, Sean Skinner and one part-time clerk Debra Comini.

The dispatch center serves as a Public Safety Answering Point (P.S.A.P.) for police and fire services. The public safety department continues to be one of the test sites for the Oakland County 800 frequency radio system.

In 2011, the dispatchers handled 6,718 calls for service. They also handled numerous calls for directions, court inquiries, reports of stray and lost animals, and other general information. Farmington's dispatch center is staffed twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.

Records personnel process all requests for reports (police, fire, medical and accidents), including Freedom of Information requests. They are also responsible for the processing of court dockets and subpoenas, false alarm billing, bicycle licenses, parking permits, non-criminal fingerprints, police clearance letters, warrant processing/validations and requests for station tours.

# **TRAINING PROGRAMS**

---

## TRAINING

The public safety department continues to seek out excellent training opportunities for both sworn and civilian personnel. The following pages will detail the training courses that personnel have attended over the year 2011. The following is a list of such training that was provided to the Department of Public Safety for free or for low cost:

- **Law Enforcement Response to Sexual Assault:** A course sponsored by the University of Michigan Department of Public Safety which helps officers have a better understanding to respond to incidences of sexual assault.
- **Emerging Trends in Technology: Sexting:** Information on the trends and issues of Sexting and how to help educate and assist today's youth.
- **VALOR TRAINING:** A free course offered by the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center and the Department of Justice regarding officer involved shootings and how to respond.
- **State and Local Law Enforcement Training Symposium:** A three day course offered free by the Department of Justice and the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center. Topics covered roadside interdiction, officer safety, hidden weapons, human trafficking, adaptive leadership, and the "Below 100" initiative.
- **Patrol Rifle Instructor School:** A course sponsored by Farmington Hills Police Department offering techniques and skills for the training officer to teach a patrol rifle program at their department.
- **Interviewing Techniques:** A course sponsored by the US Attorney's Office and the Adrian Police Department teaching techniques and skills for interviewing subjects of crime scenes.
- **Domestic Violence:** A course covering criminal law updates regarding domestic violence, stalking and aggravated stalking, PPO's, and procedural requirements in responding to domestic violence.
- **National Instant Criminal Background Check System (NICS) Training:** A course that provides training to help investigators better understand the NICS system.
- **Intelligence Commanders Course:** This course provides an opportunity for executives and commanders to gain knowledge and information about the intelligence field; offers tools to help integrate intelligence into daily operations

and presents case scenarios and examples for identifying mechanisms to resolve legal and privacy issues.

- **Cell Phone Analysis – Investigative Tool for Law Enforcement:** A seminar designed for investigators to develop a better understanding of using mobile devices as evidence in criminal cases.
- **Media Relations Training for Law Enforcement:** A course designed to provide law enforcement supervision with general media relations and social media training.
- **Below 100:** A course presented by the Department of Justice and FLETC regarding reducing officers' deaths across America.
- **Use of Force Myths and Realities:** Course that examines human performance during use of force encounters.
- **Bomb Threat Assessment Tool for Schools:** Training that provides step by step guidance on evaluating bomb threats in a school setting.
- **Inside the Tape: Homicide and Crime Scene Management Training:** A course that teaches investigators how to appropriately handle an incident involving a serious crime.
- **Pressure Point Control Tactics:** A recertification course for the department defensive tactics instructor to maintain certification.
- **Identity Theft Investigations:** A course to assist investigators who handle identity theft Investigations.
- **Legal Review and Update:** A course that updates the student on current changes and additions to the law.
- **Commercial Motor Vehicle Enforcement:** A course that provides officers with the skills necessary to enforce the Commercial Motor Vehicle Law.
- **Field Training Officer:** A course that certifies an officer to train new recruits.
- **Michigan Bullying Summit:** Course that keeps the School Liaison Officer up to date on current legalities and trends regarding bullying in our schools.
- **Pistol Instructor School:** Course that certifies an officer to be able to teach other officers how to safely hand to use firearms.

- **Firearm Laws of Michigan Training:** A course that updates the officer on the current laws regarding firearms in the State of Michigan.

In October the department conducted live burn training at the Wixom Fire Department utilizing the Wixom Burn House. A structure built to be intentionally set on fire and extinguished by firefighters for the purposes of training. Officers used this training to test out a new Thermal Imaging camera and to hone their search and rescue skills.

In May and June of 2011 the department was able to utilize the closed Flander's Elementary School to train utilizing the Simunition Fx force on force training system. Simunition Fx is a non-lethal, reduced energy weapon system that looks and acts like a real firearm. The system fires a plastic "bullet" that is filled with a dyed soap; its closest equivalent in the civilian world would be paintball. The Simunition Fx projectile does sting when it strikes a person, but does not cause any permanent damage. The department uses this system to teach officers in an environment that closely resembles the real world without putting the officer in an actual dangerous situation. The department had each officer train in scenarios that tested the officer's abilities to make quick decisions on whether to shoot or not shoot, on how to respond to an active shooter, and other tactical situations. In addition, the department utilized this training opportunity to refresh its officers on the use of defensive tactics and pressure point control tactics.





# **GRANTS AND PARTNERSHIPS**

## 2011 GRANTS AND PARTNERSHIPS

The public safety department seeks annual supplemental funding sources through grants and partnerships to enhance services and reduce taxpayer expenses. This section of the Annual Report summarizes some of the grants utilized or received in 2011.

### EDWARD BYRNE JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT (BYRNE-JAG)

In order to address instances of vandalism to the Sundquist Pavilion and the Shiawassee Park playscape area, the Farmington Public Safety Department applied for and was awarded the Edward Byrne Justice Assistance Grant (BYRNE-JAG) to install surveillance cameras in these areas. Included in this grant is funding to install an additional Pan/Tilt/Zoom (PTZ) camera that will be affixed to a pole at Grand River Avenue and Grove Street (north side of intersection) and monitored by public safety personnel in the station. This camera will be useful in monitoring crowds during downtown events to identify potential problems and to allocate public safety resources more efficiently. In addition, this camera will have the capability to enhance officer safety as traffic stops and other public safety activity in the downtown area can be monitored and additional assistance can be dispatched.

Four (4) local companies submitted bids for this project. The bid was awarded to Innovative Computers (Belleville, MI) who provided the lowest bid. The total amount of the grant is \$25,742

# **MAJOR INCIDENTS**

---

## 2011 MAJOR INCIDENTS

The following incidents are a synopsis of major incidents receiving community wide attention in 2011.

### **JULY 23, 2011 – COMMERCIAL BREAK INS**

Three suspects broke into Kitchen Masters and Beyond Salon taking money, jewelry and computers. The suspects also attempted to break into an apartment above Kitchen Master but were scared off by the home owner. Two of the suspects were arrested several days later and the third fled to Florida.

### **AUGUST 2011 – GRAFFITI**

A home on Heatherton had graffiti spray painted on the garage. Less than a week later, the same style graffiti was found on the restroom building at Drake Park and the playground equipment of Longacre Elementary School. Detectives were able to identify three suspects who confessed to the crimes.

### **OCTOBER 17, 2011 – CHARTER ONE BANK ROBBERY**

At about noon, a female approached a bank teller and handed over a note announcing a robbery and fled after getting the money. The female was wearing a costume and it was found north of the bank in a parking lot. Following a long investigation by numerous agencies, the female robber and her male accomplice were arrested and charged.

### **NOVEMBER 18, 2011 – FATAL FIRE**

At about 12:30 p.m., staff responded to report of smoke coming from an apartment at Jamestown Apartments. Upon arrival, officers forced entry into the apartment and found heavy smoke and high heat. Officers were able to locate the fire and victim in a back bedroom. The resident passed away from smoke and burn injuries the following day. The fire was contained to the apartment.

### **NOVEMBER 22, 2011 – DOMESTIC ASSAULT/BARRICADED GUNMAN**

A female came into the station to report a domestic assault that occurred at Chatham Hills Apartments. When officers went to confront the suspect, the suspect refused to allow officers in and made threats to harm anyone who tried to enter. The suspect was known to carry a handgun and had an infant child in the apartment. Officers secured the area and Oakland County Special Response Team responded to assist in the arrest of the suspect.

### **NOVEMBER 2011 – CRIMINAL SEXUAL CONDUCT**

Acting on a report of child sexual abuse from Washtenaw County, detectives conducted numerous interviews, executed a search warrant and arrested a Farmington resident for Criminal Sexual Conduct.


**DECEMBER 2, 2011 – HOME INVASION**

A home owner reported a home invasion had just occurred in the early morning hours. Detectives were called to the scene and were able to collect latent fingerprints that positively identified a juvenile suspect. This suspect was suspected of committing more than twenty (20) more home invasions in communities east of Farmington. The suspect was arrested and convicted.

**DECEMBER 19, 2011 – JETS PIZZA ROBBERY**

At about 8:30 p.m., a suspect entered the Jet's Pizza at Grand River and Nine Mile, brandishing a handgun and demanded money. This was one of four pizza store robberies in Farmington, Farmington Hills and Southfield. The suspect and two additional suspects were arrested by Farmington Hills and charged with all four robberies.
